## Active grammar

We use the Third Conditional to talk about a <u>real/imaginary</u> situation in the <u>present/past</u>.

We make the Third Conditional with ...

if + subject + past perfect + would(n't) have/could(n't) have + past participle.

Past condition Past result (hypothetical)

If I had stayed at work, I wouldn't have spent time with Jack.

or

Past result (hypothetical) Past condition

I would have cooked dinner if I'd known you were coming.

In spoken English, have and had are usually contracted to 've and 'd.



Jim lost his job last month.



He didn't buy a house.

If Jim hadn't lost his job, he would have bought a new house.



She worked out a lot.



She got slim.

If she hadn't worked out a lot, she wouldn't have got slim.







She didn't travel to Turkey last summer.

If Jessica hadn't broken up with her boyfriend, she would have travelled to Turkey last summer.



He failed his exams.



He didn't get a degree.

If he hadn't failed his exams, he would have got a degree.







He didn't understand the topic.

If he had done his homework, he would have understood the topic.
