If I have enough money, I'll buy some new shoes. I might even buy two pairs unless they're really expensive.

Examples

If my children get good grades, I'll take them to the zoo.
If I take them to the zoo, we're going to see a lot of animals there.
When we see all the animals, my children will be very happy.
And if they are happy, they might be even more motivated to study.

Forms

First Conditional to talk about the future results of real or likely situations in the present and future.

<i>If + present tense, Future Simple</i>	<i>If I do all my work on time, I'll spend some time with my family. If you have revised, you'll have no problems with the exam.</i>
<i>If + present tense, modal verb + infinitive</i>	<i>If he apologises, I might forgive him.</i>

Alternatives to *If*

something will definitely happen at a specific time	When/as soon as/after/before	<p>After I finish my homework, I'll have lunch.</p> <p>I'll look at the files before I go to bed.</p> <p>I'll call you when I get home.</p> <p>We'll announce the results as soon as they become available.</p>
We are prepared for something that might happen	In case	I'll take an umbrella in case it rains.
"If not" or "only if"	Unless	<p>Unless we do it now, it'll be too late. (= <i>If we don't do it now, it'll be too late.</i>)</p> <p>I won't comment on your work unless you ask me to. (= <i>I will only comment on your work if you ask me.</i>)</p>
