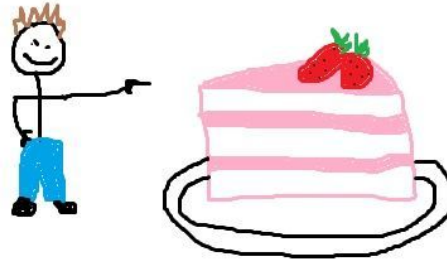

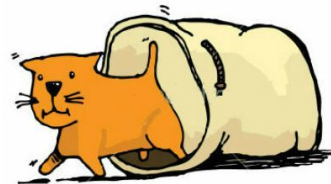

When you **save something for a rainy day**, you put something aside (usually money) for a time in the future when you need it.

*"I don't leave things to chance. I've won some money in the lottery but I'm not spending it - I'm **saving for a rainy day**."*
