#### **Ernest Miller Hemingway**

(July 21, 1899 – July 2, 1961) was an American author and journalist. Hemingway produced most of his work between the mid-1920s and the mid-1950s, and won the Nobel Prize in Literature in 1954. He published seven novels, six short story collections and two non-fiction works. Three novels, four collections of short stories and three non-fiction works were published posthumously.

Many of these are considered classics of American classic.

Born in Bay City, Michigan, she moved to New York City in 1977 to pursue a career in modern dance.






