REMEMBER

You **remember doing** something **AFTER** you have done it.

e.g. I know I locked the door. I clearly **remember locking** it.

You **remember to do** something **BEFORE** you do it.

e.g. I **remembered to lock** the door, but I forgot to shut the windows.



FORGET

You **forget doing** something
AFTER you have done it.

e.g. I'll never **forget**
seeing Rio de Janeiro.

You **forget to do** something
BEFORE you do it.

e.g. I **forgot to phone** your sister
when I was in Rio de Janeiro.



REGRET

You did something and now you **regret doing** it.

e.g. It began to get cold and he **regretted not wearing** his coat.

regret to say/ to tell you/ to inform you = I'm sorry that I have to say

e.g. We **regret to inform** you that we cannot offer you the job.



□ I was walking home from school and **stopped to play** football.

□ I **stopped playing** football two years ago, when I broke my leg.

STOP

You **stop doing** something to end an action, to finish doing it.

e.g. There's too much noise.
Can you **stop talking**, please?

You **stop to do** something so that you can do it.

e.g. An old man walking along the road **stopped to talk** to US.



□ I'm trying to run this computer program.

□ I tried clicking on the box, but it doesn't work.

TRY

Try doing something =do something as an experiment or test.

e.g. I didn't like the way the furniture was arranged, so I **tried moving** the table to the other side.

You **try to do** something so that you can do it.

e.g. I **tried to move** the table, but it was too heavy.
