
t's talk about impossible things....



When we want to express impossible or unlikely situations, we use SECOND CONDITIONAL.



Second conditional

Use Past Tenses in "if-clause" ©

Don't forget about *would* in the main sentence.

Eg. If I went there, I would meet him.

If I were you, I would help my classmates.


Note: verb 'to be' in S.C. is WERE in every person.

What's the difference between...

Second Conditional (S.C)
 If I had enough money, I would buy an expensive car.

(It's just a dream, not very real.)

First Conditional (F.C)
 If I have enough money, I will buy some shoes.
 (It's much more possible than the last situation)




If I had a lot of money, would travel around the world.
