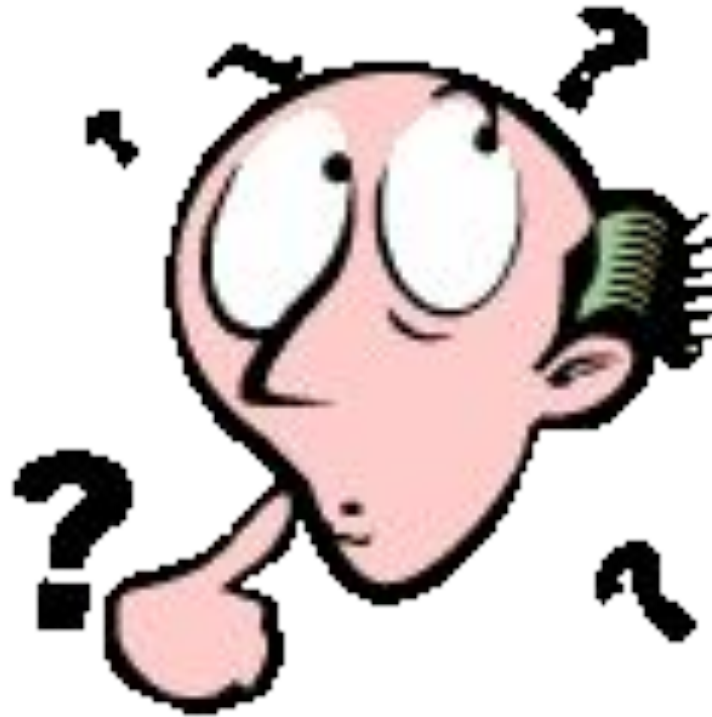


Let's talk about impossible things....



When we want to express impossible or unlikely situations, we use **SECOND CONDITIONAL**.



Second conditional

Use Past Tenses in “if-clause” 😊

Don't forget about **would** in the main sentence.

Eg. If I went there, I would meet him.

If I were you, I would help my classmates.

Note: verb ‘to be’ in S.C. is WERE
in every person.

What's the difference between...

- Second Conditional (S.C)

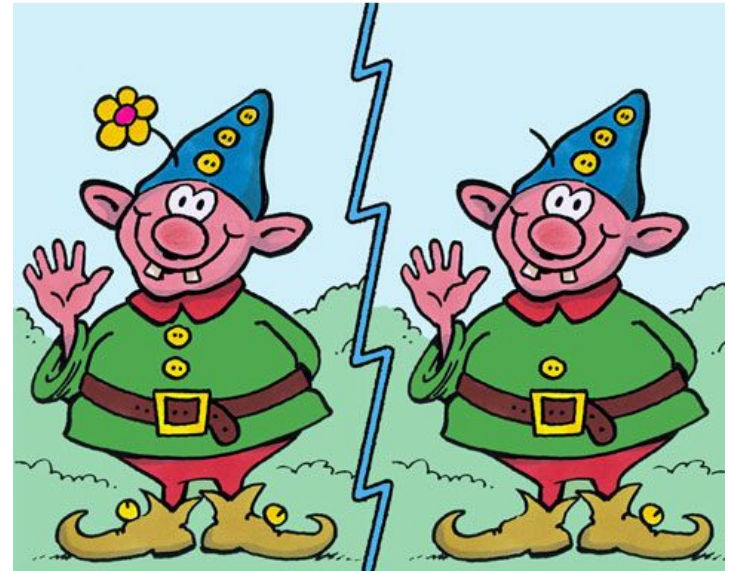
If I had enough money, I would buy an expensive car.

(It's just a dream, not very real.)

- First Conditional (F.C)

If I have enough money, I will buy some shoes.

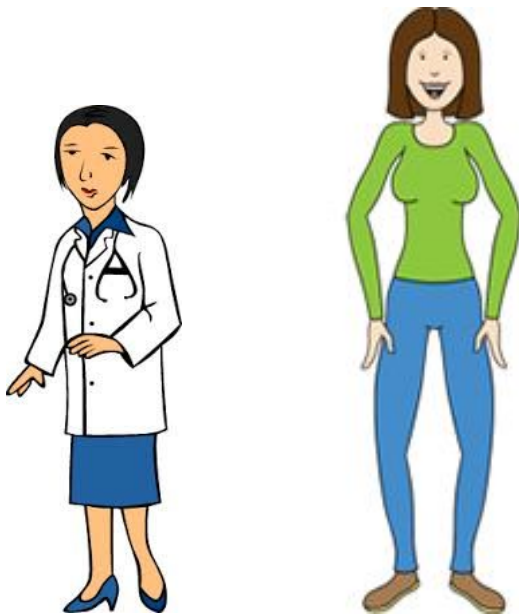
(It's much more possible than the last situation)



If I had a lot of money,
I would travel around the
world.



**If she were taller,
she wouldn't wear
high-heeled shoes.**



If I were you, I would stay
at home.
