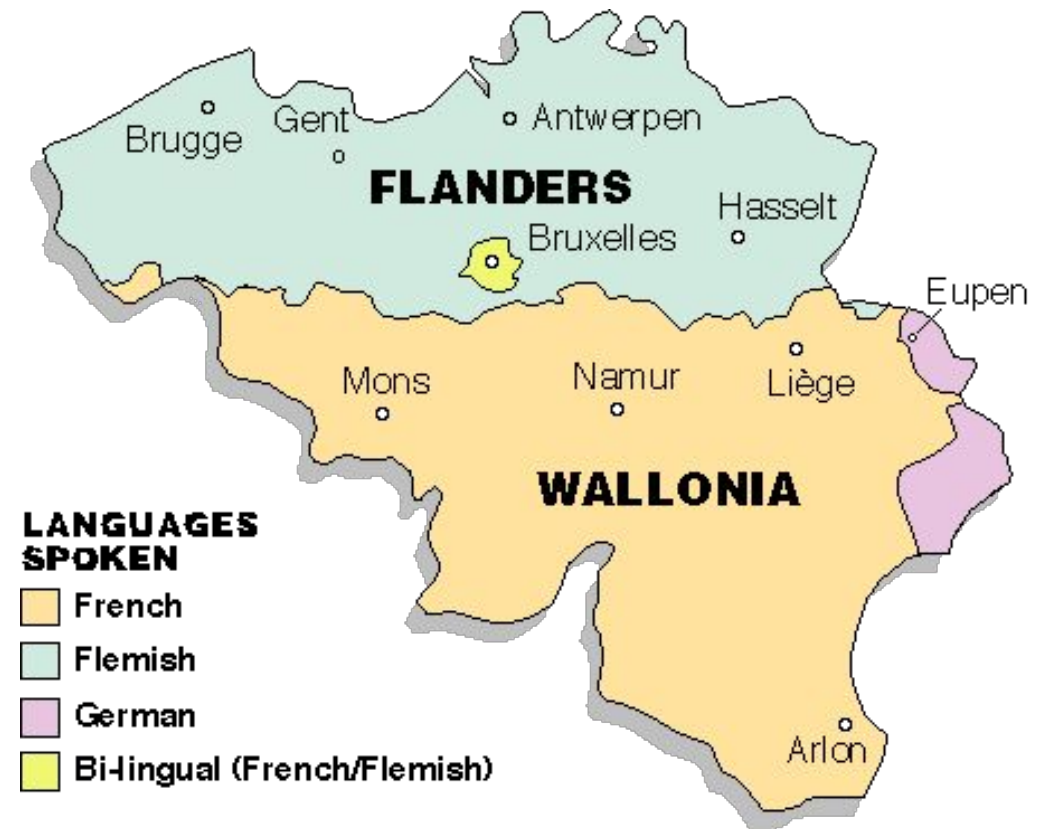

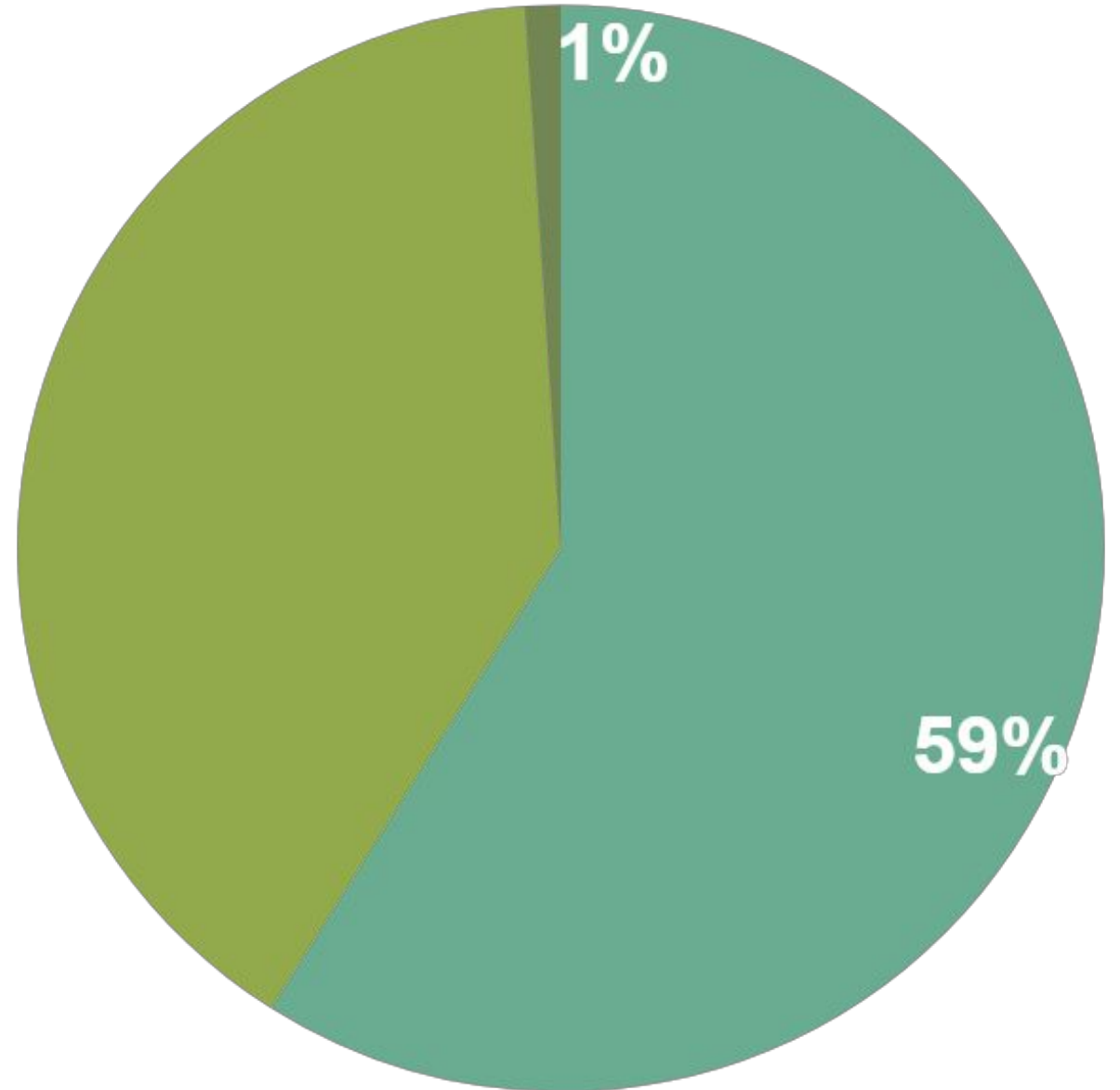
According to (Valasek, 1990) Belgium is divided into four linguistic regions: monolingual Netherlandic region, French, German and Netherlandic - French region of Brussel's

Government

Language laws

- 1878 law on the use of languages consisted of enforced language rights for Dutch speaking people in Flanders

- 1898 law of Equality it made Dutch an official on equal footing with French.
