

Peter's cultural and educational activities during his trip to England



The Grand Embassy was a Russian diplomatic mission, sent to Western Europe in 1697–1698 by Peter the Great. In addition to its main purpose, this trip gave Peter an opportunity to see Europe, to enhance others' knowledge and to bring something new to Russia.



In England, Peter stayed for about three months, first in London and then, mainly in Deptford, where he managed to enlarge his shipbuilding education. At his request, the building selected was small and simple, with a door opening directly onto the riverbank.

He was fascinated by the construction of a wind dial with a weathervane on the roof of Kensington Palace.



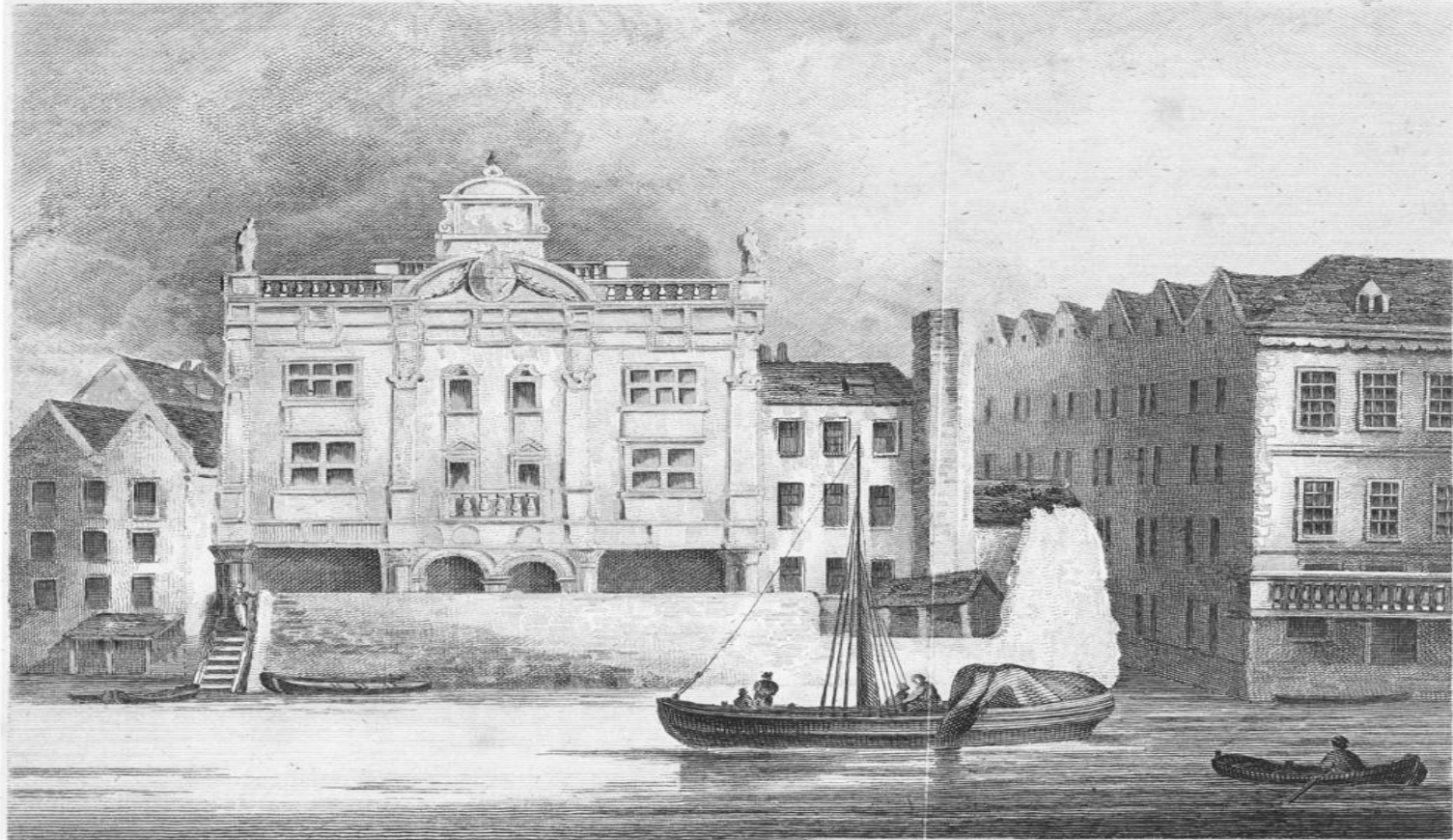
Peter's one visit to Kensington Palace was the full extent of his ceremonial life in London.

THE DUKE'S THEATRE, DORSET-GARDENS.

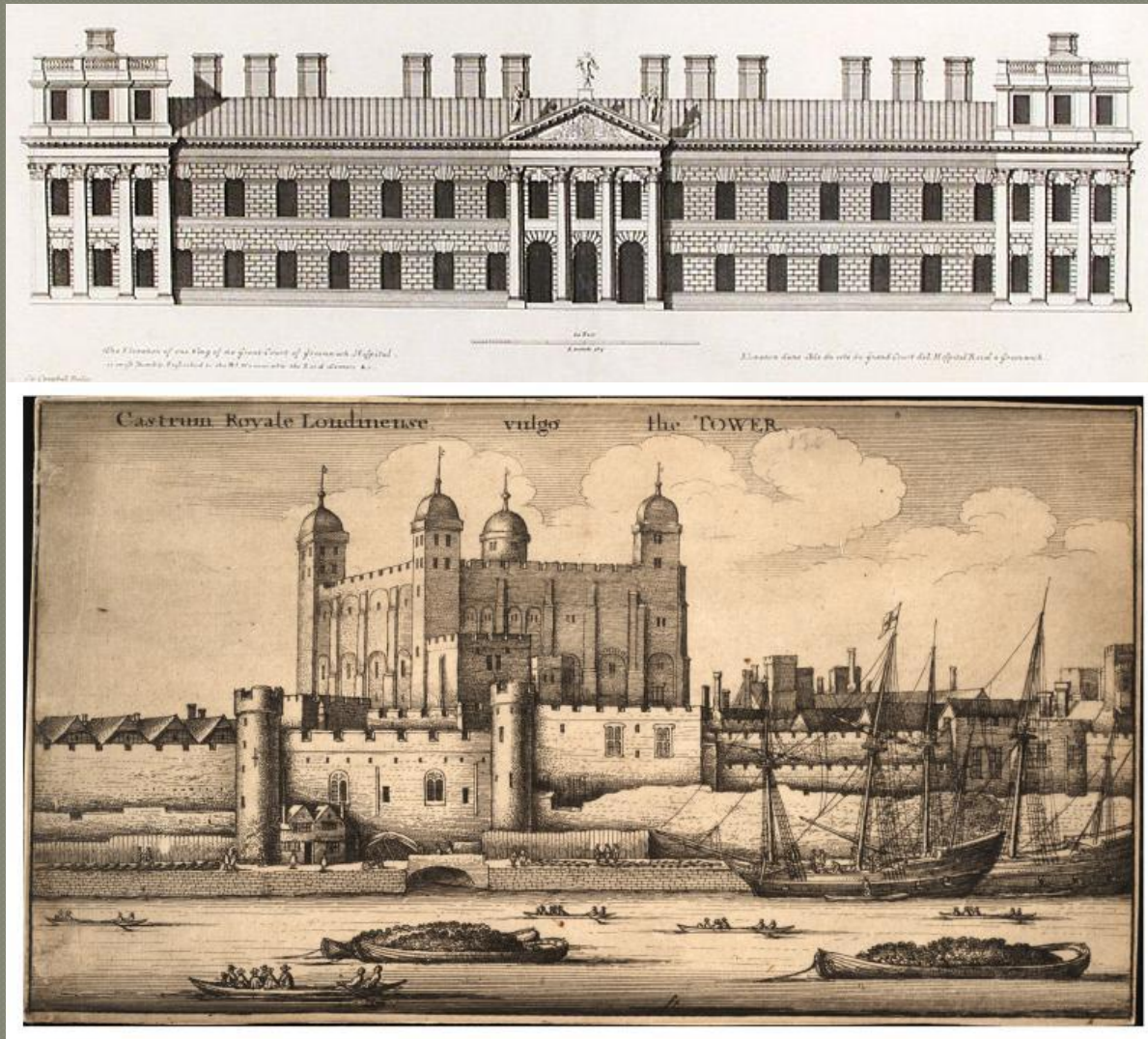
This Theatre was built by Sir Christopher Wren, and first opened by the Duke of York's Company, on their removal from the Play-house in Little Lincolns-Inn fields, the 9th Nov^r 1671.— Betterton, stage manager, with Kynaston, Hart, Tony-Leigh, Lady Shingby, M^r Betterton, and other principal actors, performed here until the union of the Duke and the King's Companies in 1682, and performances were continued occasionally until 1697.—The whole building was demolished about April 1709 and the present offices of the New River Company have been erected on the site of the Theatre.

Peter's interest in church affairs extended beyond the established Church of England.



He visited the Greenwich Naval Hospital and the Tower of London.



Struck by the excellence of English coinage, and the technique by which the coins were made, he went back repeatedly. Two years later, when Peter began to reform Russia's badly irregular coinage, the English system served as a model.
