**Father Christmas** is short and fat. He is wearing a green coat and white gloves. He has a bell and a long stick.

People in France eat '**buche de Noel**' for dessert. It is a chocolate cake. It looks like a log.



Swedish people eat '**Lussekatter**' for Christmas breakfast. This is a special bun with raisin. It looks like letter "S".



Traditional British dessert is **Christmas pudding**. It is round and brown with raisins, cherries and nuts. People usually decorate it with holly.



People in Finland start their Christmas breakfast with **rice porridge**. They put an almond in the pot. The person who gets it, will be lucky next year.





**Panettone** is a traditional Italian dessert. This is yellow bread with raisin and dry fruit. It is big and round.



German people eat '**stollen**' at Christmas. It is a long bread with nuts, spices and dried fruit inside. People always put powdered sugar on top of it.

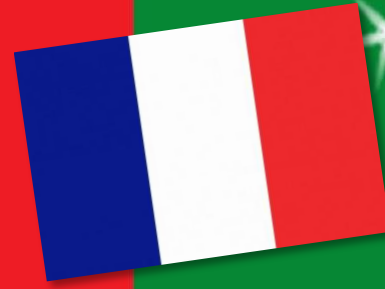

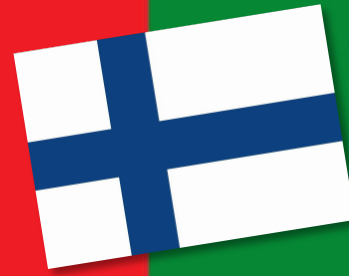
