
## Linking words.

But, although and however



O Although and however are more formal than but, and are used more in formal writing.



O It joins two clauses. It must go before the second clause.


## Example:

- O I don't write many letters, but I send emails a lot.
- O I like dogs, but I don't like cats.

## Although

O It joins two clauses. It can go at the start of the sentence in which case a comma separates the clauses.

O It can also go in the middle of a sentence in which case it is preceded by a comma.



Although I don't write many letters, I send emails a lot.

I send emails a lot, <u>although</u> I don't write many letters,



O It joins two sentences, and introduces the second the second sentence.

O It is preceded by a full stop and fallowed by a comma.

E.g.

I don't write many letters. However, I send emails a lot.

## So and Because

O So introduces a <u>result</u> or <u>consequence</u>.

E.g.

He was sick, so he left the office.

O Because introduces a reason.

E.g.

He left the office because he was sick.
