Good questions to ask

### Why are you asking questions?

- Understand the situation
- Choose reasons to buy
- Let people talk / get trust

#### How to choose reasons?

- Age of kids
- Activity
- Parental involvement
- GPA
- Problems

#### Good questions

- Are your kids in high school or are they in elementary school?
- Are they involved in any sports or activities?
- Is it busy sometimes?
- Do you help them with homework or are they pretty independent?
- How do they like school? Can't wait to go back or enjoying summer more? :)
- How are they doing in school? As, Bs?
- Which subject they get the most homework in?
- What subject takes the longest to get you A's?
- Are you thinking of college already?

#### Good way to ask it right

- 2-3 questions
- Use stories with questions
- Respond to answer
- Ask questions you need
- NO CLOSED QUESTIONS
- Let them talk and listen

# If you keep getting bad answers then just stop asking those questions

(If they don't have homework then don't ask "Do you get lot of homework?" Tell them: "I know you don't get much homework but why everybody has been getting them is that they help to study for tests and revise"

Make a conversation! It is wise not to ask questions in a row like a journalist. Ask a question, let them answer and ask fallow-up question if needed (Q:hardest subject? A: math Q: What's hard about math- teacher does not explain enough in school or homework is too complicated? Etc-this shows that you listen what they say and not just doing your sales pitch).
