WHAT IS AN ADVERBIAL CLAUSE?

A group of words which contains a subject and a finite verb (the main verb in a sentence) that describes a verb, an adjective and another adverb

Adverbial Clause of Result

These clauses are always linked with so that, so+adj.\adv. + that and such +a+ noun+that.etc.

Examples

1.Colin was so weak that he could not run.

2.lt was *such a strange story* that no one believed it.

Clause of comparison

They answer the questions HOW MUCH?, HOW LITTLE?. The principal conjunctions are AS, AS THOUGH/IF, AS.....AS, SO.....AS and structures of comparison. If there is doubt or unreality, the past tense is used. Sometimes, an inversion subject/verb is produced

Examples

- 1.He is older than he looks.
- 2.No one can run faster than Raman.
- 3.You may do as you please.
- 4. It all ended as I expected.
- 5.As he has lived so he will die.

ADVERBIAL CLAUSE OF MANNER

These clauses are introduced by as, as if and as though

Examples

- 1.Please do as I have told you.
- 2.He cries as if he were mad. 3.She speaks as though he were the boss.

The subjunctive is used after as if and as though
