BREAK DOWN

- to be unable to control your feelings and to start to cry



- Thieves **broke into** our office and stole the computers.



BREAK INTO

- to enter a building illegally to steal something



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- **War broke out in 1914.**



BREAK OUT

- If something dangerous or unpleasant breaks out, it suddenly starts



BREAK OUT

- The two men **broke out** of the prison.



BREAK OUT

- to escape from a place or a situation



- Each child broke off a piece of bread.



BREAK OFF

- Break a piece of something



- The new law **brought about** a great change in the lives of the people.



BRING ABOUT

- to make something happen, especially to cause changes in a situation



- We threw water in his face to try and **bring him round**.



BRING SOMEBODY ROUND

- to make someone who is unconscious become conscious



BRING SOMEBODY ROUND

- I think we can **bring** him **around** to agreeing with the plan.



BRING SOMEBODY ROUND

BRING SOMEBODY UP

- to care for a child until it is an adult
