Don't forget to include

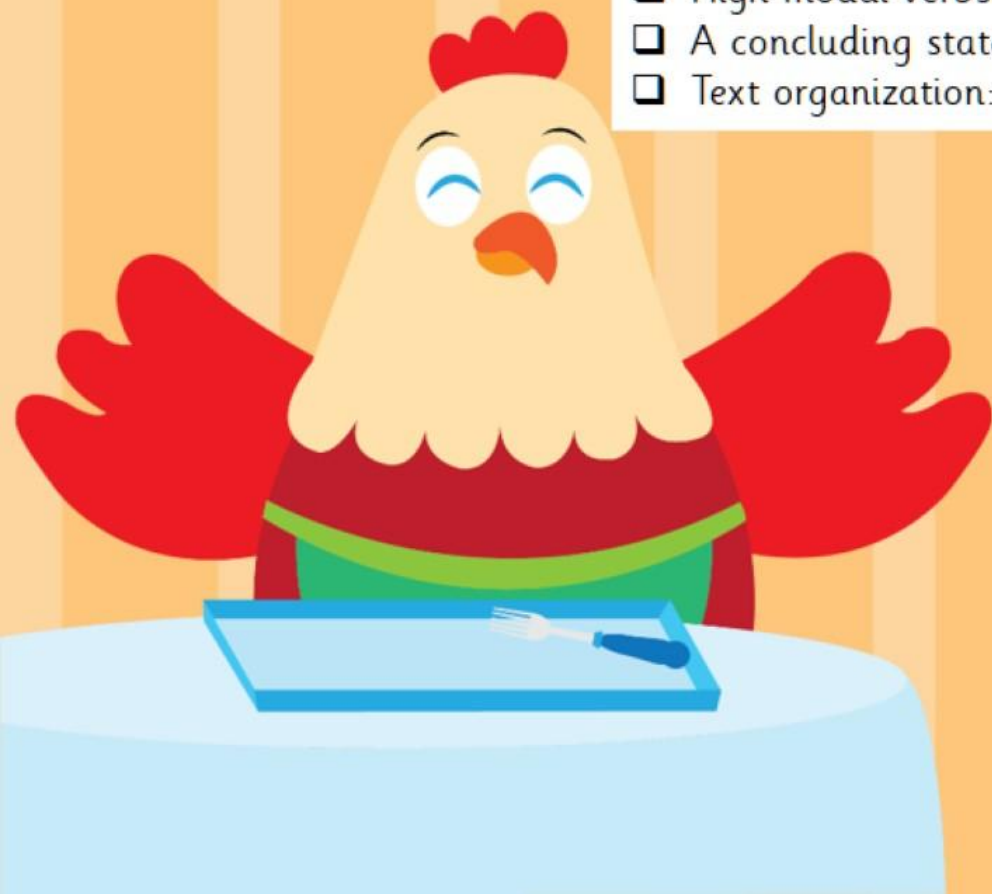
- An opening statement

Don't forget to to include

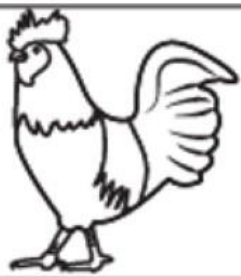
- An opening statement
