































dreamed of whales; whole

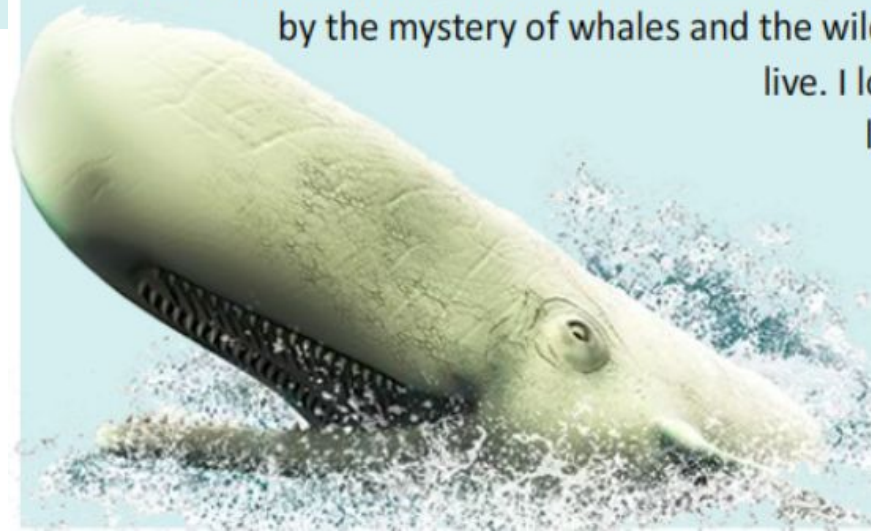
schools of whales swam

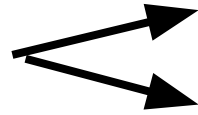
