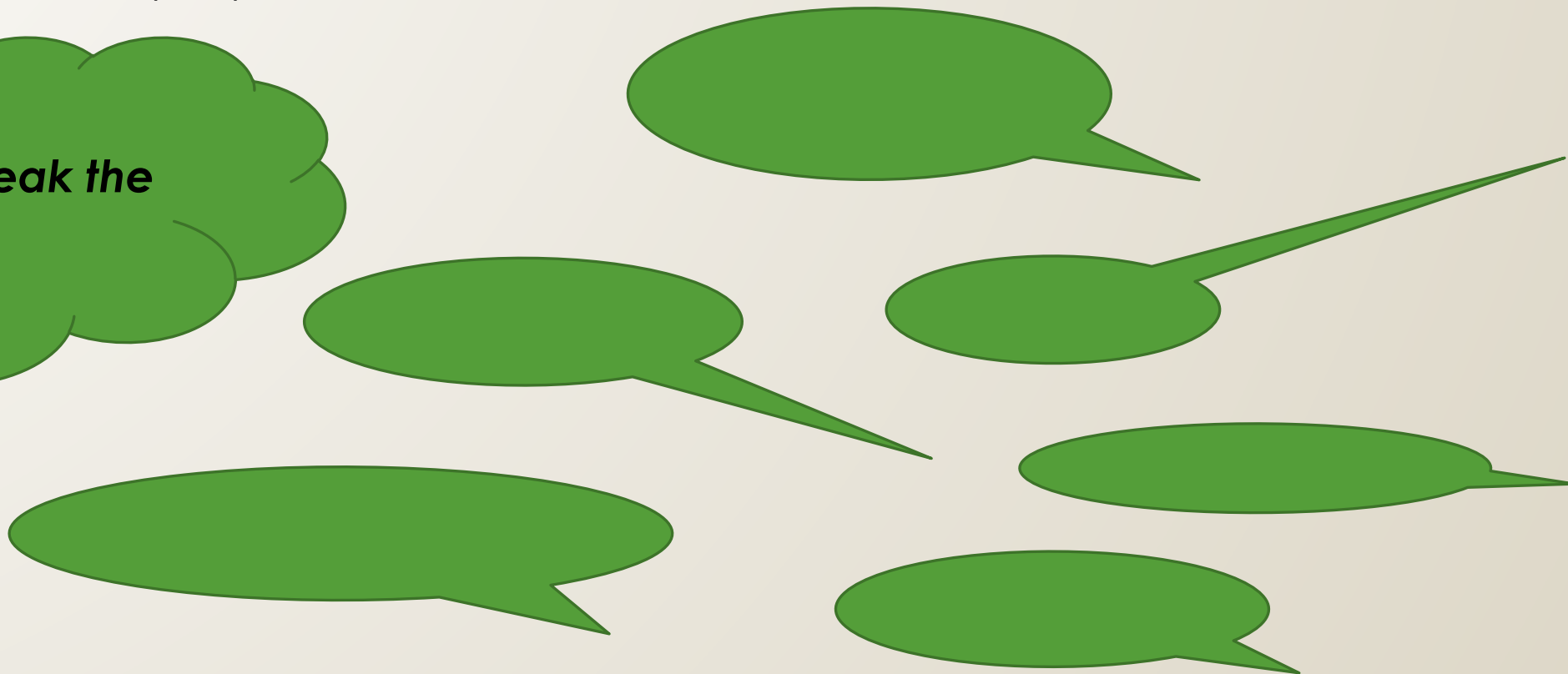

Keep it light and easy! Don't ask too personal questions

- Where are you from originally?
- Is your family here with you?
- Where did you meet your wife / husband?
- Do you have any brothers or sisters?
- Do you come from a big family?
- How are your children?
- Do you have any pets?



Small talks with FORD - Occupation

Be tactful and delicate

- What is keeping you busy these days? (Don't ask: Have you got a job?)
- Oh, that's interesting! How did you get started in that?
- How long have you been in your field?
- What's the best part of your job/ project?
- **No questions about money!!!**

Small talks with FORD - Recreation

Find similarities /don't talk all the time about your way to relax

- What do you do for fun?
- Do you play any sports?
- How long?
- Have you seen any good movie recently?

Small talks with FORD - Dreams

Smile, listen, learn

- Any plans for the weekend?
- What's your dream place to visit?
- What countries do you find worth visiting?
- What do you want to do / to see / to paint / to read next?

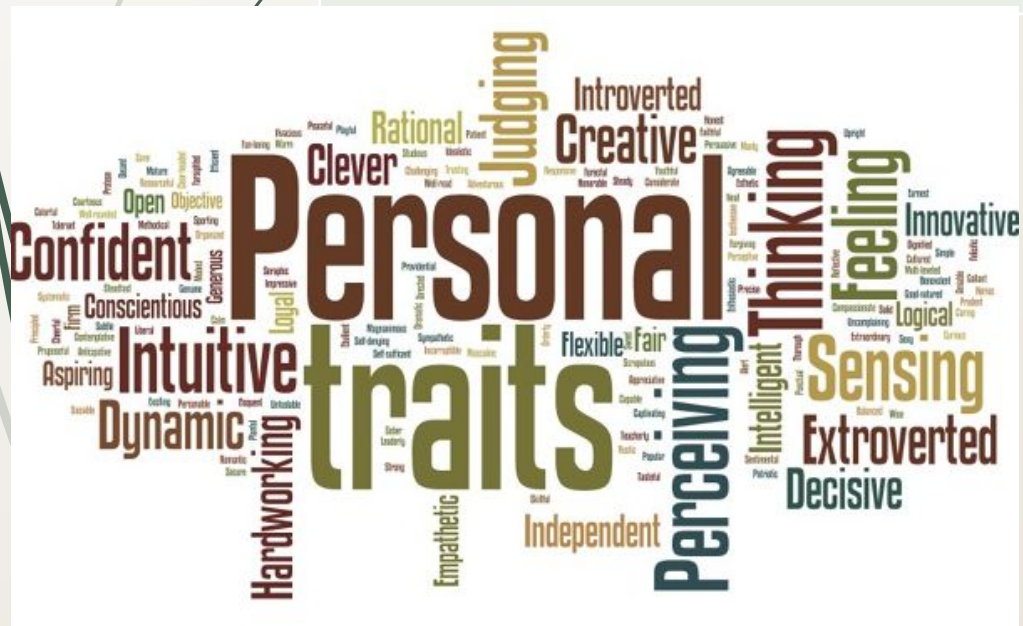
