be scared stiff/scared to death/scared out of one's wits

- extremely frightened



- **scared stiff**

to get so scared that you are not able to move

I was scared stiff when I heard noises in my house last night.



shake like a leaf

- To tremble violently with fear or nervousness.

*My brother is so strong and scary looking that he leaves people shaking like a leaf when he threatens them.
I was shaking like a leaf when I went up to deliver my speech in front of all those people.*



Meaning of idioms **"Quake/shake like a leaf"**

If you quake like a leaf, you tremble because you are afraid, nervous, or very cold.

- She was quaking like a leaf when she saw the monster.

- She didn't think about it at the time, but when she realized that she was in real danger, she was shaking like a leaf.

have/wear/pull a long face

- a sad or disappointed expression on someone's face

"Why the long face?"

: a question asked to know why someone is sad or unhappy.



long face (noun)
: a disappointed or miserable facial expression.

go bright red

- If you go/turn red, your face becomes red because you are angry or embarrassed

She tried to deny it, but she went very red.



be over the moon

- very happy or pleased



IDIOM

Over the moon

very happy or pleased about something

be on cloud nine

- to be extremely happy and excited

Examples of idioms

Definition:

To be very happy about something

Sentence:

She just bought her first new car and she's on cloud nine.



IDIOM

On cloud nine



very happy and excited

He was on cloud nine when Rebecca was born.
To promote to General Manager put me on cloud nine.

be on top of the world

- extremely happy



IDIOM

On top of the world
extremely happy or proud



When I heard his good news I felt on top of the world.
He sent me flowers! I'm sitting on top of the world.

be green with envy

- wishing very much that you had what someone else has

Green

IDIOM: "Little Billy was green with envy when he saw his friend with a new toy car."

- *When a person is 'green with envy', he or she feels very jealous.*

Green with envy

used in a context

To describe the feeling of jealousy towards someone.

Example sentence

Although Emilia had everything she always wanted, she often gets green with envy whenever she looks at someone's success, growth and accomplishments.

- to get very angry

People Idioms: Going Crazy

Blow up Explode 	Go ape Express wild excitement or anger 	Go bananas To become irrational or crazy 
Go mental To suddenly become extremely angry 	Go nuts To become crazy 	Hit the roof To become very angry 
Pop one's cork To release one's anger; to blow one's top 	Go off the deep end To unexpectedly become very angry 	Fly off the handle Lose one's temper suddenly and unexpectedly

phrase

to become very angry very quickly

Example:

"Dad's going to go through the roof when he sees what I did to his car!"

Alternative:

to hit the roof

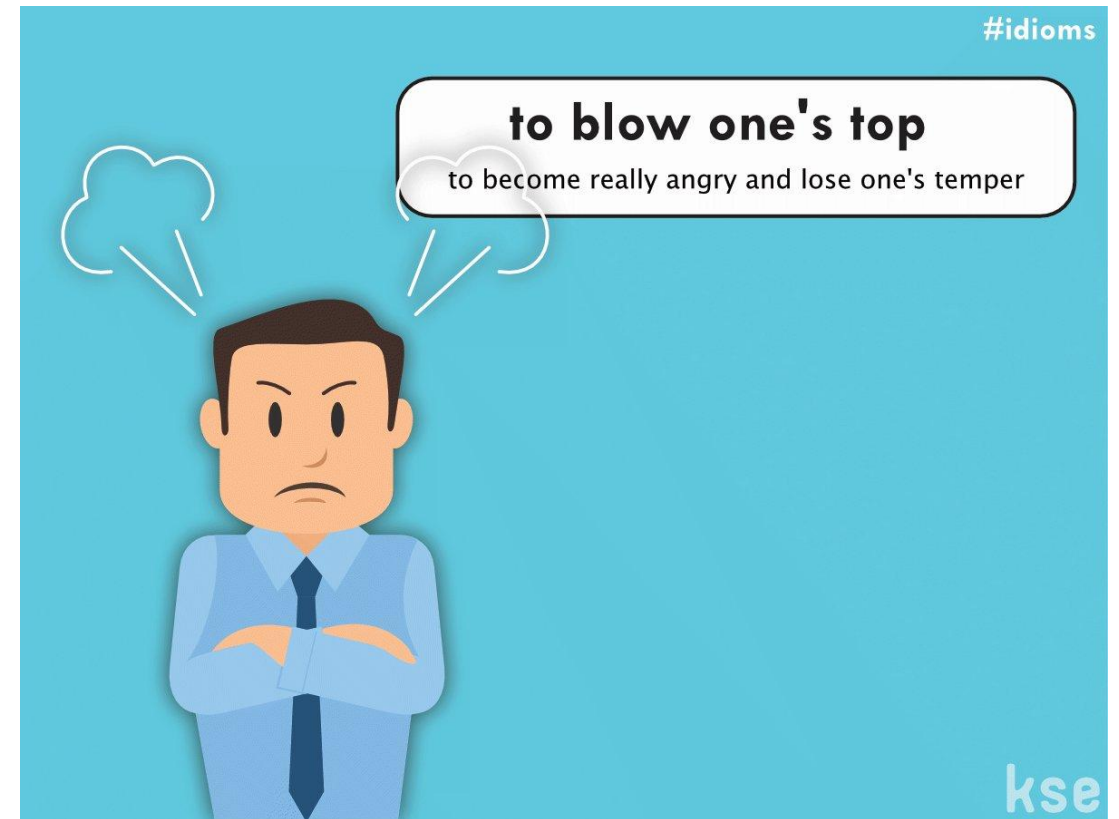

blow one's top

- to become extremely angry



My father will blow his top when he sees what happened to the car.

shake with rage

To tremble with anger



He started **shaking with rage** when another driver cut in front of him.

tear one's hair out

- If you tear your hair out over a problem, you are worrying a lot about it



tear one's hair out

idioms to be anxious/frustrated/angry

The family members are tearing their hair out while they wait for news of their lost son.

To have/get butterflies in (one's) stomach.
To be nervous or anxious about something.



I get butterflies in my stomach when I have to perform in front of so many people.

Butterflies in the stomach

Meaning:

a weird feeling caused by fear or nervousness



Example:

1. On the day of his wedding James had butterflies in his stomach.
2. I had butterflies in my stomach before my job interview.
