 - Lifestyle


Causes of voluntary migration

- higher wages





 Mexicans are currently the single largest group of foreign-born residents in the country. In 2013, the United States counted 41.3 million individuals of foreign birth; 28 percent, or 11.6 million, were Mexican.











Mexican diaspora in the USA

The Mexican diaspora in the United States is comprised of approximately 37.7 million individuals who were either born in Mexico or reported Mexican ancestry or Hispanic origin, according to tabulations from the U.S. Census Bureau 2016 ACS.
