Savage Reservation. Lenina (Beta vaccination worker) and

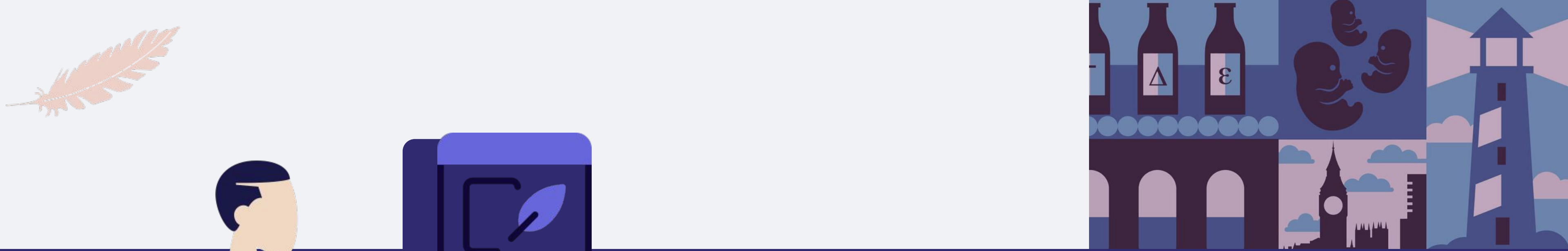
Bernard visit the Savage Reservation together and meet

Scientific advances may give more power to states to control and change the way people think and act

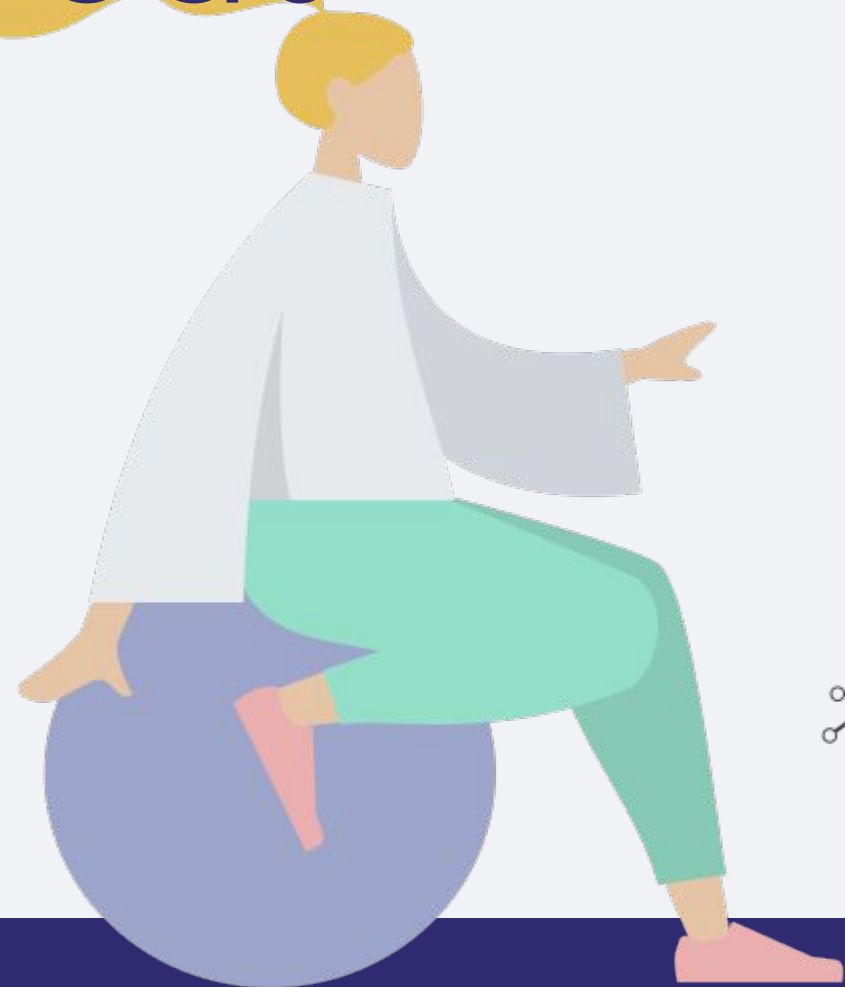

The World State depends on the idea that everyone works for everyone else. The society must have unity.



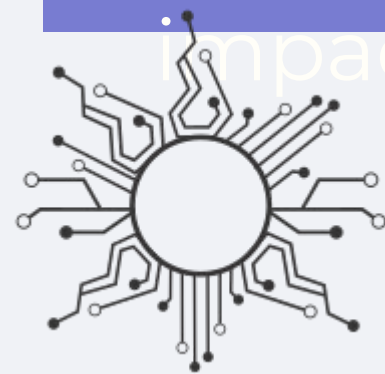
What the book made me think about
