'Multi-million' star found dead in bed

MARILYN MONROE: 'IT LOOKS LIKE SUICIDE'

MARILYN MONROE, 36-year-old Hollywood sex-symbol, was found dead in bed behind locked doors in her luxury bungalow early today.

She was clutching a white telephone, still on its hook. On her bedside table, among thirty bottles, was an empty one which had contained sleeping pills.

The star who walked with a wiggle was naked—as she always slept—and covered only by a sheet and blanket.

Tonight, as her body lay in a dusty basement at Hollywood's Westwood Village mortuary, coroner's officer Guy Hockett said: "It looks like suicide."

Los Angeles county coroner, Dr. F. Curphy, said a twelve-man "suicide team" would determine whether her death was accidental or not. The probe might take a week.

Marilyn's death was discovered in the middle of the night. The housekeeper at her Hollywood home, Mrs. Eunice Murray, woke up at 2 a.m. and saw the light on under Marilyn's door.

She tried the door and knocked, but could not rouse Marilyn. She called the star's personal physician, Dr. Ralph Greenwald, and together they broke into the room.

Stormy

Another doctor, Dr. Herman England, was called. Marilyn was dead. Doctors think she died between 2 and 3 a.m. on Saturday.

It was the end of a brilliant and stormy career which began with her famous "milk calendar" picture, and ended with her being fired from

the film "Something's Got to Give" for being late on the set.

Marilyn's closest girl friend, attractive brunette Pat Newcomb, was the last person to see her alive. Pat had dinner with Marilyn at her home last night.

Later, she said: "Marilyn was so happy. She was full of high spirits." Before turning in for the night Marilyn called a "cherish" Good-night, "honey" to her bookkeeper.

Marriages

The star, whose marriages were in the multi-million-dollar bracket, had been having periodic flirtations for three years.

Her three marriages failed. In turn her husbands were politician Jim Dougherty, banker, Earl Jay Miller, and playwright Arthur Miller.

Mr. Dougherty was piloting in a small car in Hollywood when he crashed the news. "I'm sorry," he said.

Like her marriages, Marilyn's film-making ran into trouble.

In 1959 she became a white flinger. In 1960 she was ousted in Hollywood for exclaiming after working on "The Misfit."

Come-back

Marilyn regarded "Something's Got to Give" as a come-back film. She had been dropped from the film mail had dropped from the film mail.

Last night stars named the world's tallest of the Marilyn type. Mr. Frank Sinatra, who starred with her in "Let's Make Love," said: "She was the sexiest girl I ever saw."

John Wayne, who starred with her in "The Seven Year Itch," said: "Marilyn was taking heavy doses of barbiturates. I dropped the film and sent her to hospital."

Her death is a cruel blow to film-maker Joe Layton, who said: "Marilyn was a very witty girl but was frightened when I finally told her to stop."

Heath sees Premier after '6' surprise

TALKS on Britain's entry into the six-nation Common Market were postponed yesterday in Brussels after a 16-hour marathon session.

They will start again in the autumn but no definite date has been fixed. This intensive discussion, closed some surprise in official circles in London. Britain's chief market negotiator, Lord Pym, met

Edward Heath, fire house last night from his talks with the six.

He departed from London Airport to Chicago, the Prime Minister's official spokesman says, to report to Mr. Heath's crisis negotiators of a breakthrough in the talks. They had not yet been made, he said.

But he looked tired and weary after four days of day-and-night negotiations and he was obviously disappointed.

At the airport he said the talks had "enabled us to reach a broad measure of agreement over many details of a FINAL agreement with the President."

But reports from Brussels say the crucial problem of safeguarding food exports from Canada, Australia

and New Zealand is still unsolved following a last-minute "blocking" move by France.

Mr. Heath said he saw no reason for postponing the meeting of Commonwealth Prime Ministers in London next month.

The British Government will, however, be likely to announce a "standstill" agreement with the President.

It will phase out the six talks is expected next week.
