


What cultural events and shows do you know?











a comedy club	an event at which objects such as paintings are shown to the public
a musical	a performance of music by one or more musicians or singers
an art exhibition	an entertainment programme where a performer makes us all believe there is something wonderful in our own world
an open-air theatre	outside structure with rows of seats, each row usually higher than the one in front, from which people can watch a performance
a classical concert	a performance of piano music usually given by one person or a small group of people
a circus	a play in which part of the story is sung to music
a piano recital	a performance that is intentionally funny either in its characters or its action
a magic show	a group of travelling performers including acrobats or those who work with trained animals, or a performance by such people usually in a large tent


