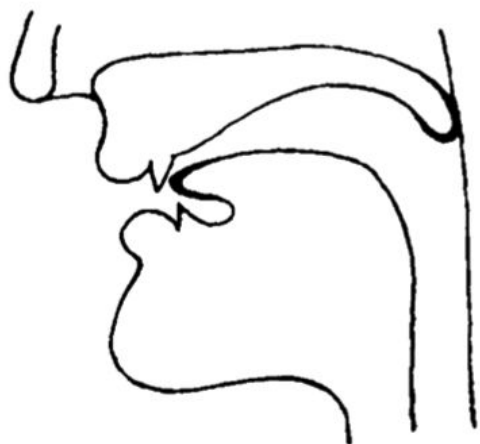
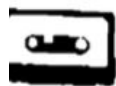


Fig. 13 /θ/ and /ð/

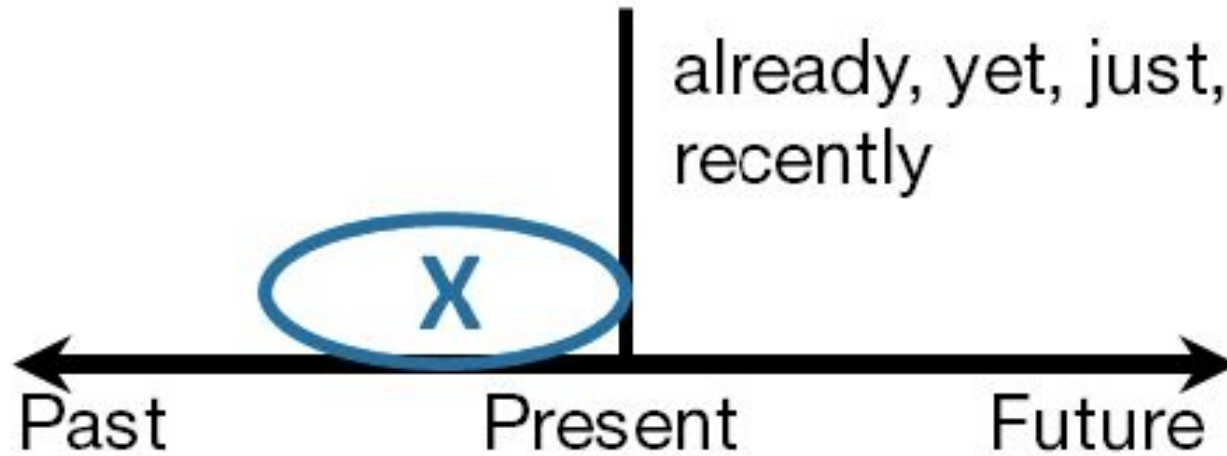

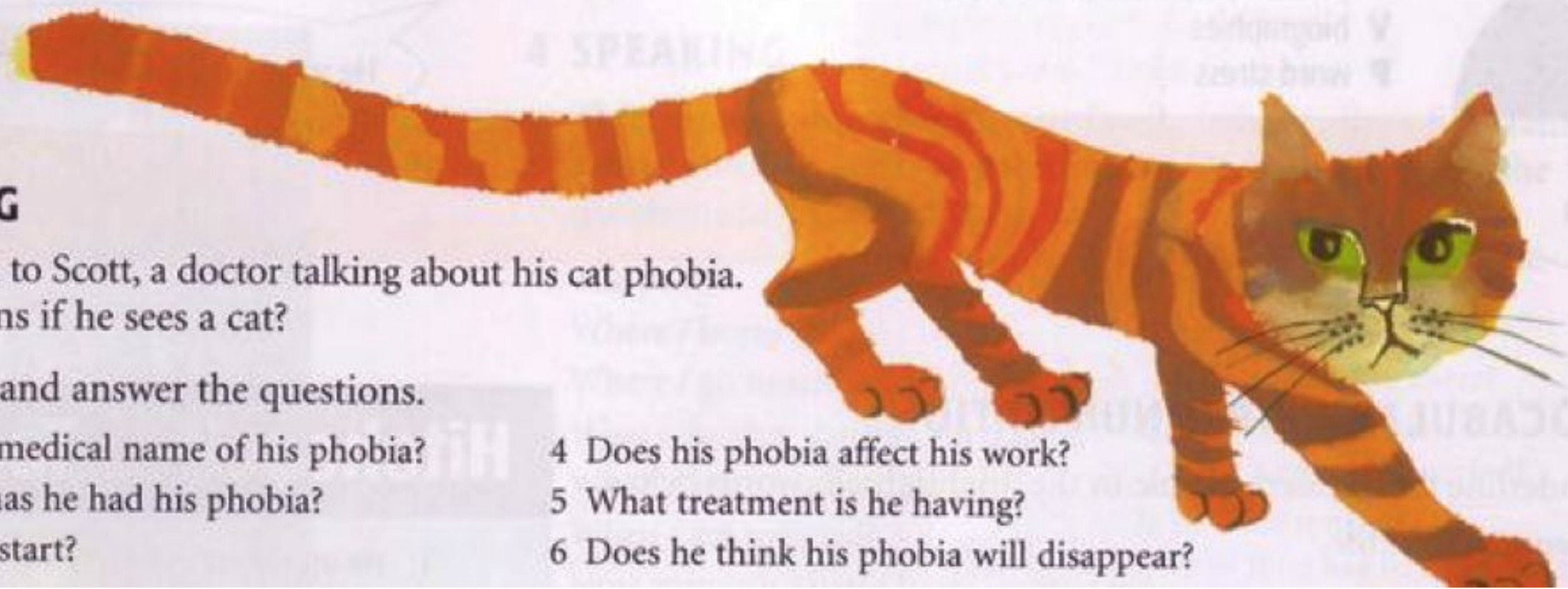
