Nouns, <u>articles</u> & determiners

- a = one thing or a person
- Rachel works in a bank.
- Can I ask a question?
- There's a woman at the bus stop.
- I haven't got a computer.



Nouns, <u>articles</u> & determiners

- an before a/e/i/o/u (if pronounced as vowel!)
- Do you want an apple or an orange?
- Where's there an <u>u</u>mbrella?
- That's an interesting question.
- This is **an** <u>u</u>nusual animal.

```
• <u>But</u>: a university □ /<u>juː</u>nɪˈvɜːsəti/
a European □ /<u>jʊə</u>rəˈpiːən/
```

Singular	Plural
• a flower	□ some flowers
• a train	two trains
one week	□ a few weeks
this student	☐ these students
• a nice place	some nice places

Some things are <u>collective plural</u> in English:

- Do you wear glasses?
- Can I borrow your scissors?
- You've got nice jeans/trousers.
- Where did you buy these shorts.
- She doesn't like wearing tights.
- Have you seen my pyjamas?
- □ also: a <u>pair</u> of



Nouns, articles & determiners

Irregular plural forms:

one man/womar	□ two men/women
• a child	many children
• one foot	□ two feet
this sheep	☐ these sheep
• a fish	some fish
• a mouse	☐ two mice
• a person	☐ two people
one criterion	□ two criteria



Nouns, articles & <u>determiners</u>

- Determiners are used to make uncountable nouns countable:
 - Please give me 2kg of rice.
 - I would like *some* coffee.
 - Do you have a lot of time?
 - There isn't much space in my flat.
 - I only have (a) little time. Make it quick.



Nouns, articles & <u>determiners</u>

•some and any

(□rules apply for 'somebody', 'anything', etc.)

- pos.: I have some apples.
- neg.: I don't have any apples.
- ques.: Do you have any apples?

• but:

- <u>offer</u>: Would you like **some** coffee? (yes)
- <u>expectation</u>: Have you got **some** news? (yes)
- 'no limit': You can do any exercise you want to.
