new look.



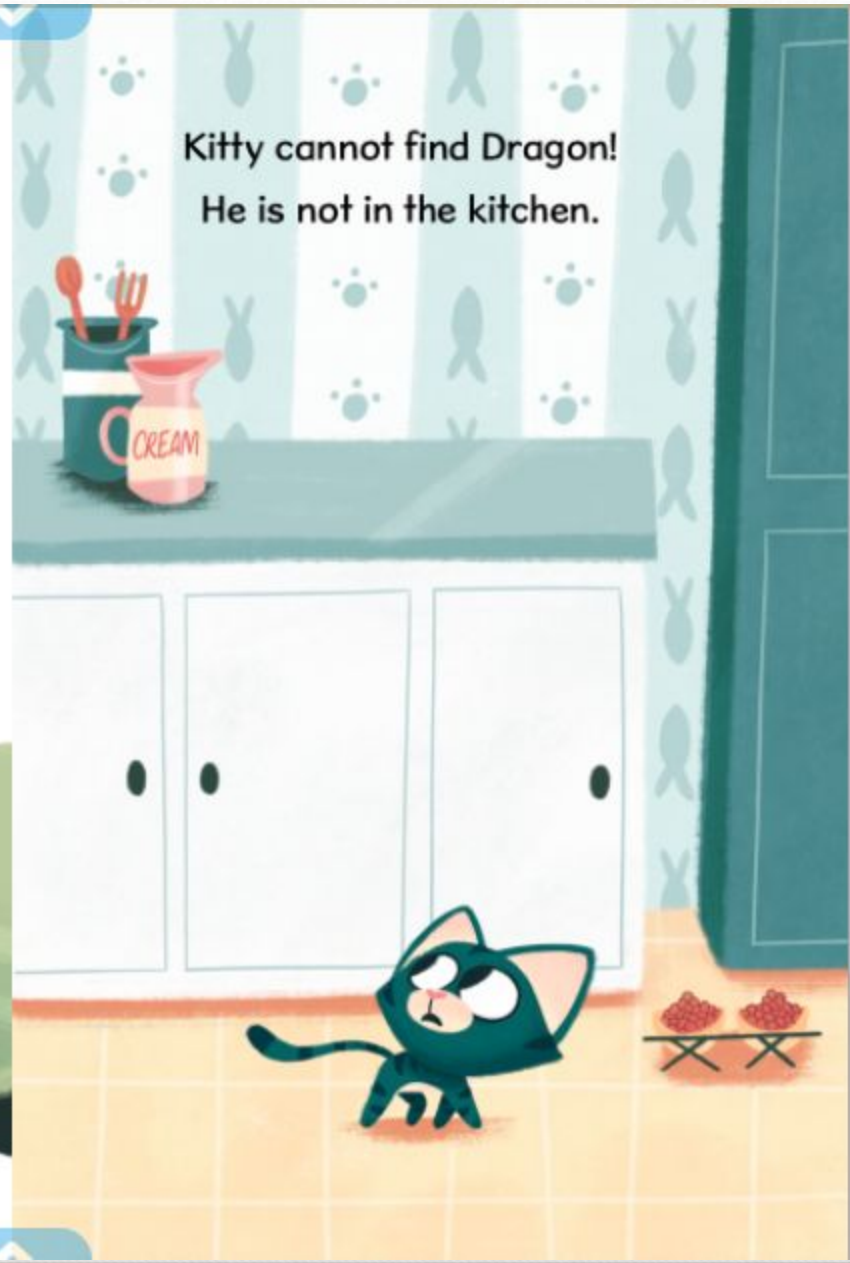


But Dragon misses the way
