economic

The word economic is related to the economy or finances.

*For example: The president stated that the economic situation was very serious.*


economical

If something is economical, it saves money ("not wasteful").

*For example: The most economical way to see Brazil is by air.*

effective

**Effective** means achieving the results that you want (successful).

*For example: The cheaper pills are just as **effective** in treating cold.*







efficient

If something is **efficient** it is done in a good way, without wasting time, money or energy.

*For example: Lighting is now more energy **efficient**.*

ill

If someone has an illness or disease, you usually say that they are ill.

*For example: He missed a lot of school when he was ill.*








sick

Sick means physically or mentally unwell; nauseous.

*For example: He felt sick after eating twelve cakes.*
