

The Four Types of Paragraphs

- Narrative: tells the details of one main event
- **Descriptive:** paints a picture, only using words, about what a person, place, or thing is like
- Expository: presentation of information, opinions, or ideas / it exposes something about a topic
- 4) Persuasive: when expressing an opinion, you attempt to persuade someone that you are right. A persuasive paragraph is developed with reasons based on facts.



## **Descriptive and Process Paragraphs**

A descriptive paragraph explains how someone or something looks or feels.

### What is a descriptive paragraph?

- O A descriptive paragraph is a paragraph that describes a *person, place or thing*.
- Using this description allows the reader to form a better mental image of the whatever is being described.

# Writing a Descriptive Paragraph

#### 0 Make sure to choose a meaningful person, place, or thing.

- Before you begin your paragraph, you have to be sure to pick something that is worth describing.

# 0 Introduce the person, place, or thing you are describing.

- If you want to get the reader's attention, then you should let him or her know what you're describing as soon as possible instead of leaving them guessing.

# **Descriptive Paragraph**

Descriptive type of paragraphs are written in such a way to describe something with words that allow your reader to imagine the scene what you're describing. It is a text full of detailed observations. They are recorded, using sensory language. Descriptions are like narrative paragraphs, with visual characteristics unfolding in a dramatic way.

#### Example:

"The petite young girl merrily skipped around the blossoming, fragrant bushes."

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### **Descriptive Paragraph**

Try to use descriptive adjectives to really paint a picture of each noun you write. Pick out strong action verbs so that the reader can see and feel the action in the paragraph. You can compare your subject to other things to help paint your picture. You want to be sure to focus on only one subject so that you can take the time to describe it fully.

### **Strategies for Writing a Descriptive Paragraph**

- Uses words that help readers see, hear, feel, smell and sometimes taste what is happening.
- Includes plenty of details.
- Expresses how the writer feels.

# Process Essay

- In a process paper you either write about the steps the reader needs to take to do something, or you describe how something is done. If you see the following key words in your prompt, be sure to write a Process Essay.
  - Describe how "X" is done.
  - List the steps involved in (preparing) "X".
  - Explain what happened in "X".
  - What is the procedure involved in (preparing) "X"?
  - Example:
    - Write an essay describing the steps in preparing for Eid Al Adha.

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
# **Process Essay**

- □ Process Analysis is a "how to do it" essay.
- You show in words how to do things: what steps are taken from beginning to end.
- □ Finally, you tell what you will have when the process is finished.
- Transition words: first, second, afterwards, before, then..

#### **Process Paragraph Examples**

Begin, by combing ½ cup peanut butter and 1 cup chocolate chips in a microwave safe bowl, microwave for 1 minute. Than, stir to blend all ingredients thoroughly. Next, add ½ teaspoon vanilla, place the 9 cups of chex cereal in a very large bowl. Now, pour the peanut butter chocolate mixture over the cereal and toss evenly, making sure all the cereal gets a good covering. Finely, coat with powdered sugar, sprinkling evenly over the cereal and tossing as you sprinkle to cover each piece well.

## **Opinion paragraphs**

### What are opinion paragraphs?

- They are paragraphs in which you have to present your personal opinion on a particular topic.
- You must state your opinion clearly and support it with appropriate reasons and examples.
- •Your idea is expressed through three sections: >Introduction (or beginning) in which you explain your idea
  - Main body, or supportive ideas, in which you make your point through examples
  - >Conclusion, an ending, in which you give a transition to your arguments.

# **OPINION PABAGBAPH**

- You give your ideas about a topic
- Introduce your opinion in the first sentence ( Topic sentence)
- You make the reader agree with your opinion, so you need to support your opinion with reasons and supporting details

 End your paragraph with a strong concluding sentence

### THE INTRODUCTION

This is the first paragraph of your essay, in which you are supposed to introduce the subject and to state your opinion clearly.

To state your opinion, these are the language structures you may use:

I believe/feel/think that... From my point of view...To my mind/way of thinking...As far as I am concerned...In my opinion/view...I am totally against...I completely disagree with...I don't agree with..It seems/appears to me that...I (completely) agree with/that...

#### Top Tips for writing

- 1. Write your essay in clear paragraphs. Use phrases like *First of all, In addition* and *To sum up* to start each paragraph.
- Express your own opinion using I think, In my opinion or I believe.
   Mention other viewpoints with phrases like Some people think and say whether you agree or disagree with them.

### Comparison/Contrast Paragraphs




**Comparing** is telling how two or more things are alike. **Contrasting** is telling how two or more things are different.


Authors use clue words such as *similar to, like,* or *as* to compare. Authors use clue words such as *different from*, *but*, or *unlike* to contrast.

# Characteristics of a Compare & Contrast Paragraph

- Explains or describes two or more people, places, things, or events.
- Compares by telling how the two people, places, things, or events are alike.
- Contrasts by telling how the two people, places, things or events are different.
- Uses clue words both, also, too, as well, on the other hand, however, but, and while to help readers understand the similarities and differences.


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## Problem/Solution Paragraphs

Problem/solution writing first explains a problem and then proposes one or more solutions to that problem.

- 3. Organise your essay in paragraphs.
  - paragraph 1 introduction
  - paragraph 2 arguments for the subject
  - paragraph 3 arguments against the subject
  - paragraph 4 conclusion
