THE BRITISH GRAVE OF THE UNKNOWN WARRIOR (OFTEN KNOWN AS 'THE TOMB OF THE UNKNOWN WARRIOR') HOLDS AN UNIDENTIFIED BRITISH SOLDIER KILLED ON A EUROPEAN BATTLEFIELD DURING THE FIRST WORLD WAR. HE WAS BURIED IN WESTMINSTER ABBEY, LONDON ON 11 NOVEMBER 1920.











A CENOTAPH IS AN EMPTY TOMB OR A MONUMENT ERECTED IN HONOUR OF A PERSON OR GROUP OF PEOPLE WHOSE REMAINS ARE ELSEWHERE. IT CAN ALSO BE THE INITIAL TOMB FOR A PERSON WHO HAS SINCE BEEN REINTERRED ELSEWHERE. ALTHOUGH THE VAST **MAJORITY OF CENOTAPHS HONOUR INDIVIDUALS, MANY NOTED CENOTAPHS** ARE INSTEAD DEDICATED TO THE MEMORIES OF GROUPS OF INDIVIDUALS, SUCH AS THE LOST SOLDIERS OF A COUNTRY OR OF AN EMPIRE.





IMPERIAL WAR MUSEUMS (IWM) IS A BRITISH NATIONAL MUSEUM ORGANISATION WITH BRANCHES AT FIVE LOCATIONS IN ENGLAND, THREE OF WHICH ARE IN LONDON. FOUNDED AS THE IMPERIAL WAR MUSEUM IN 1917, THE MUSEUM WAS INTENDED TO

RECORD THE CIVIL AND MILITARY WAR EFFORT AND SACRIFICE OF **BRITAIN AND ITS EMPIRE DURING** THE FIRST WORLD WAR. THE MUSEUM'S REMIT HAS SINCE **EXPANDED TO INCLUDE ALL**

COMMONWEALTH FORCES HAVE BEEN INVOLVED SINCE 1914. AS OF 2012, THE MUSEUM AIMS "TO PROVIDE FOR, AND TO ENCOURAGE,

THE STUDY AND UNDERSTANDING OF THE HISTORY OF MODERN WAR AND

'WARTIME EXPERIENCE'"







THE GUARDS MEMORIAL, ALSO KNOWN AS THE GUARDS DIVISION WAR MEMORIAL, IS AN OUTDOOR WAR MEMORIAL LOCATED ON THE WEST SIDE OF HORSE GUARDS ROAD OPPOSITE HORSE GUARDS PARADE LONDON, UNITED KINGDOM. IT **COMMEMORATES THE WAR DEAD** FROM THE GUARDS DIVISION AND RELATED UNITS DURING THE FIRST WORLD WAR, AND OF THE HOUSEHOLD DIVISION IN THE SECOND WORLD WAR AND OTHER **CONFLICTS SINCE 1918.**

Australia

THE AUSTRALIAN WAR MEMORIAL IS AUSTRALIA'S NATIONAL MEMORIAL TO THE MEMBERS OF ITS ARMED FORCES AND SUPPORTING ORGANISATIONS WHO HAVE DIED OR PARTICIPATED IN WARS INVOLVING THE COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA. THE MEMORIAL **INCLUDES AN EXTENSIVE NATIONAL** MILITARY MUSEUM. THE AUSTRALIAN WAR MEMORIAL WAS OPENED IN 1941, AND IS WIDELY REGARDED AS ONE OF THE MOST SIGNIFICANT MEMORIALS OF ITS TYPE IN THE WORLD. THE MEMORIAL IS LOCAT **AUSTRALIA'S CAPITAL, CA**

IT COMMEMORATES THE 70,000






New Zealand

THE NEW ZEALAND NATIONAL WAR MEMORIAL IS LOCATED NEXT TO THE NEW ZEALAND DOMINION MUSEUM BUILDING ON BUCKLE STREET, IN WELLINGTON, THE NATION'S CAPITAL. IT WAS DEDICATED IN 1932 ON ANZAC DAY IN COMMEMORATION OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR.

THE MEMORIAL ALSO OFFICIALLY REMEMBERS THE NEW ZEALANDERS WHO GAVE THEIR LIVES IN THE SOUTH AFRICAN WAR, WORLD WAR II AND THE WARS IN KOREA, MALAYSIA AND VIETNAM. THE WAR MEMORIAL CONSISTS OF THE WAR MEMORIAL CARILLON, THE HALL OF MEMORIES, AND AN UNKNOWN NEW ZEALAND WARRIOR INTERRED IN A TOMB CONSTRUCTED IN 2004 IN FRONT OF THE HALL OF MEMORIES. FOUR ROLLS OF HONOUR **BEAR THE NAMES AND RANKS OF 28,654 NEW** ZEALANDERS. LYNDON SMITH'S BRONZE STATUE OF A FAMILY GROUP IS THE FOCAL POINT FOR THE COMPLEX, WHICH IS VISITED BY APPROXIMATELY 20,000 PEOPLE A YEAR.
