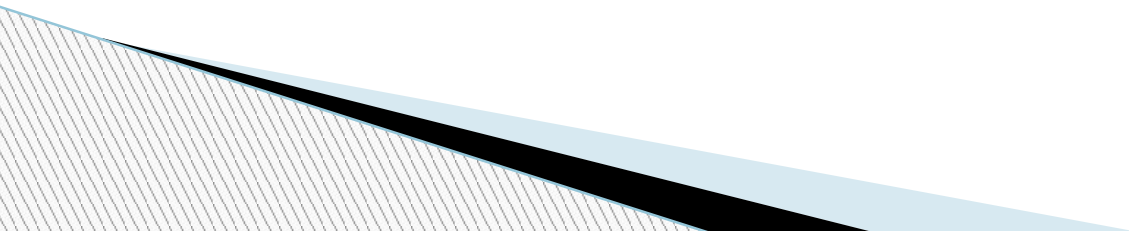

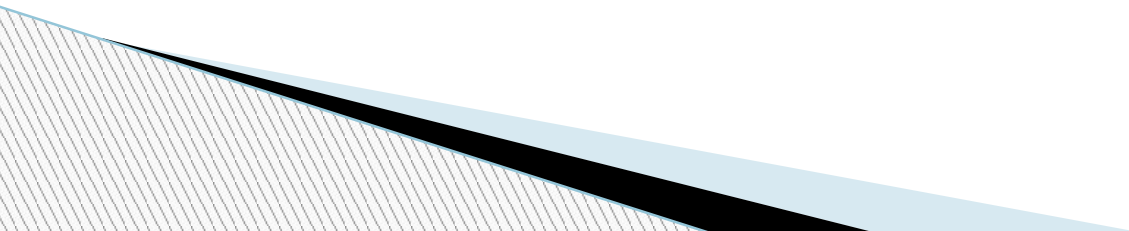

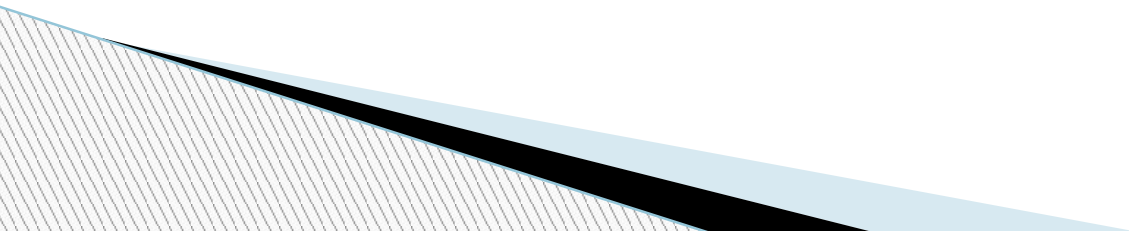

Whose ... ?, possessive 's

We use 's with a person to talk about family and possessions:

- 1 He's George Clooney's father.
It's James's house.**
- 2 They're my parents' friends.**
- 3 Whose is this bag? It's Maria's**
- 4 The end of the film, the city
centre**

We use Whose ... ? to ask about possessions.

We can ask:

Whose is this bag?

OR

Whose bag is this?

You can answer:

It's Maria's bag.

It's Maria's

Be careful with 's : It can be two things;

Maria's mother ('s = of Maria)

Maria' s Spanish ('s = is)

Whose / Who's

Who's = Who is, e.g.

Who's that girl? She's my sister.

Whose = of who, e.g,

Whose's this bag? It's Jack's.

whose and who's are pronounced the same.
