

The first president





Born in 1732 Into a Virginia planter family






He pursed 2 interests:

From 1759 to the outbreak of the American Revolution,
Washington managed his
lands around Mount Vernon
and served in the Virginia House of Burgesses.





He soon realized that the Nation under its Articles of Confederation was not functioning well, so he became a prime mover in the steps leading to the Constitutional Convention at Philadelphia in 1787.


Thomas Jefferson

The third president


During Jefferson's second term, he was increasingly preoccupied with keeping the

Thomas Jefferson: "I have sworn upon the altar of God form of tyranny over the mind of man"







(1861 - 1865)


The 16th president

"In your hands, my dissatisfied fellow countrymen, and not in mine, is the momentous issue of civil war.


The government will not assail you....

Roosevelt had pledged the United States to the


"good neighbor"

policy, transforming the Monroe Doctrine


from a unilateral American manifesto

Roosevelt brought hope as he promised prompt, vigorous action, and asserted in his Inaugural Address, "the only thing we have to fear is fear itself"




John Fitzgerald Kennedy


(1961 - 1963)

Texas.






William Jefferson-Clinton

forces to war-torn Bosnia
and bombed Iraq when Saddam Hussein
stopped
United Nations inspections
for evidence of nuclear, chemical,
and biological weapons.



He proposed the first balanced budget in decades and achieved a budget surplus.


