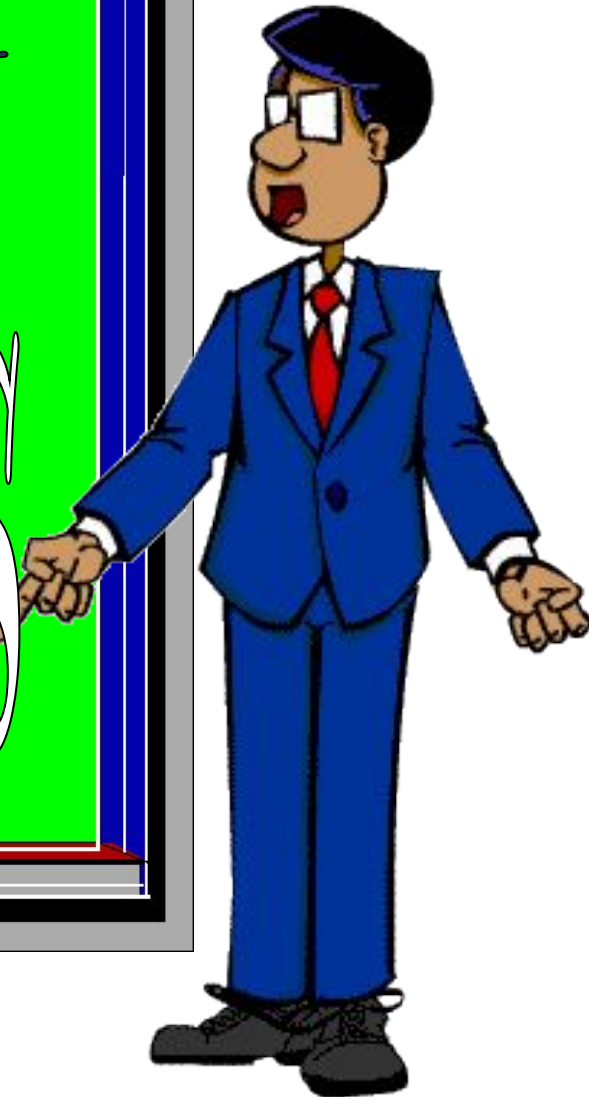

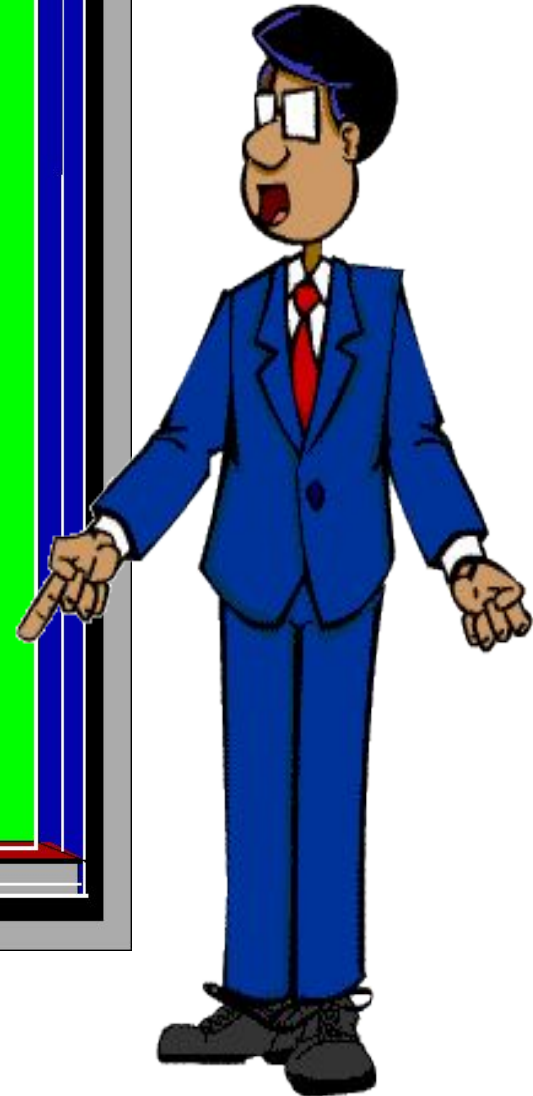
PAST CONTINUOUS

The Past continuous describes an action or event in a **time before now**, which began in the past and **was still going on** at the time of speaking.

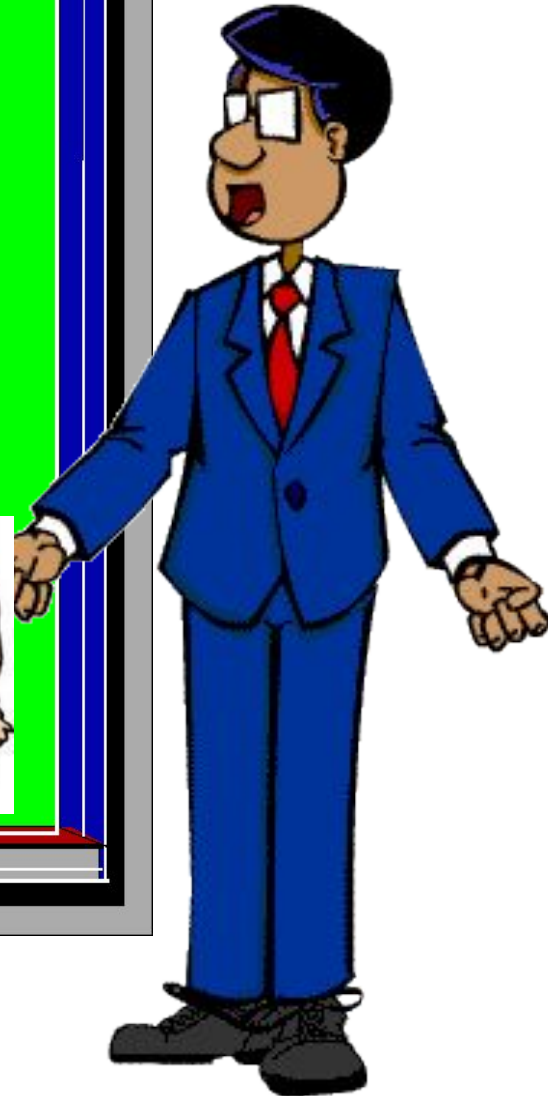

I **was** reading.
you **were** reading.
he **was** reading.

they **were** reading.

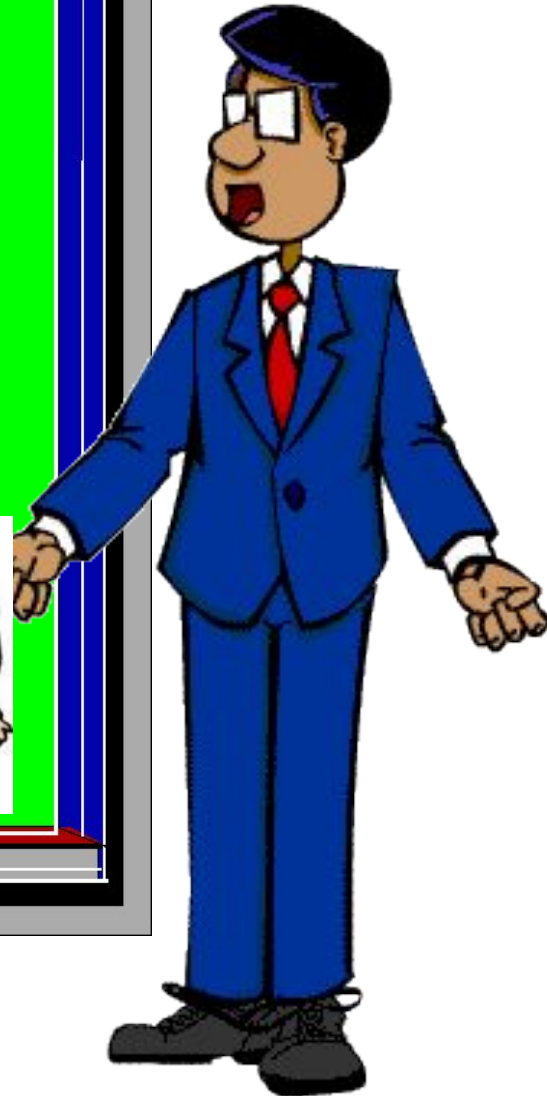
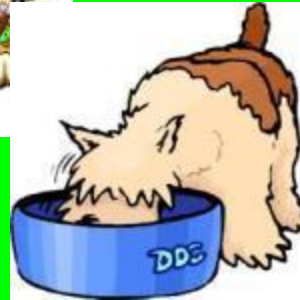

Use :

The Past Continuous is used to:

- Talk about an action that had already started and was still continuing at a particular time.

At 8.00 O'clock I **was** sleeping.



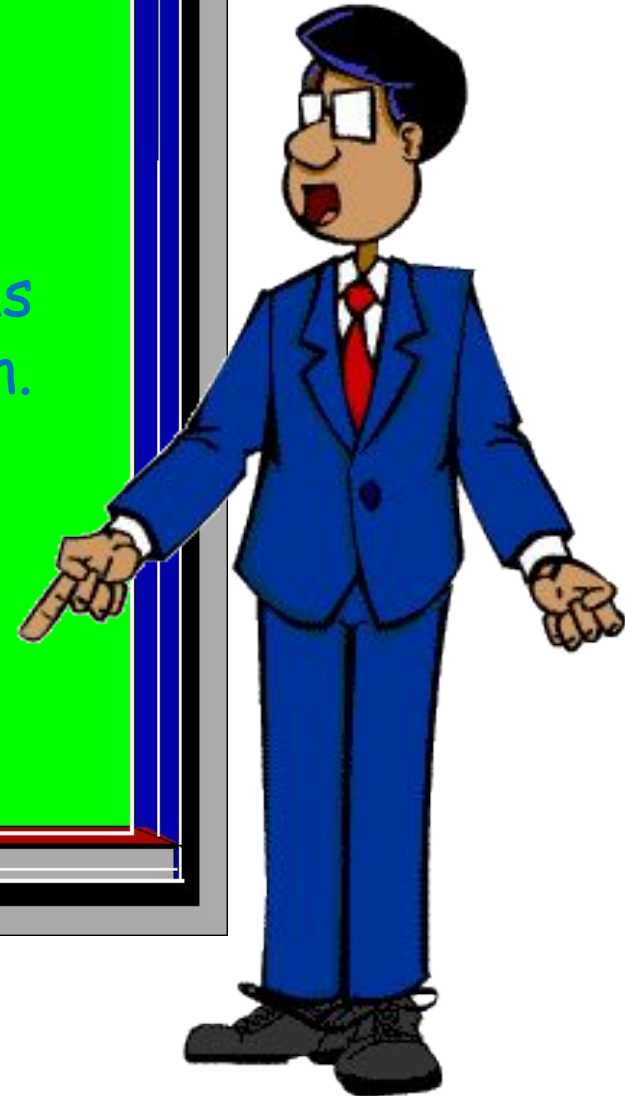

It is also used to:

-describe an unfinished action that was interrupted by another event or action.

I **was watching** TV when she phoned.

It is also used to:

-describe two actions that were both continuing at the same time in the past. In this case we use past continuous for both actions.

While I **was** reading. Mary **was** sleeping.

Notes:

-When you talk about things in the past, **when** is most often followed by the **simple past**, whereas **while** is usually followed by **past continuous**.

-**While** expresses the idea of "during that time".

The following examples have similar meanings, but they emphasize different parts of the sentence.:

I was writing an e-mail **when** my computer went off.

While I was writing an e-mail, my computer went off.
