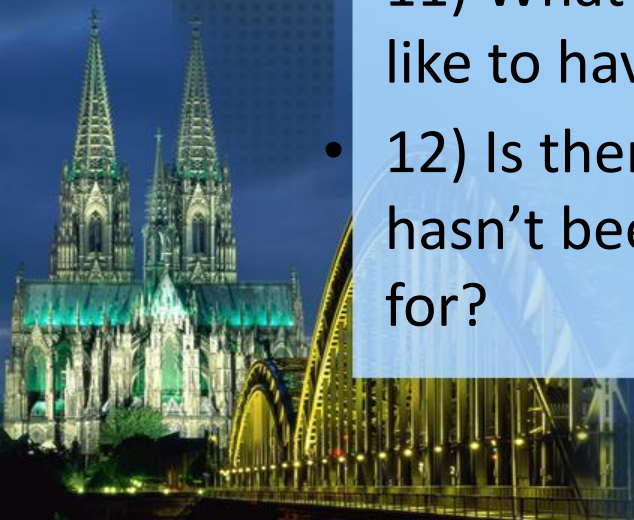


- 1) What things are usually advertised?

- 6) Which of the arguments would you give for or against the advertised things?



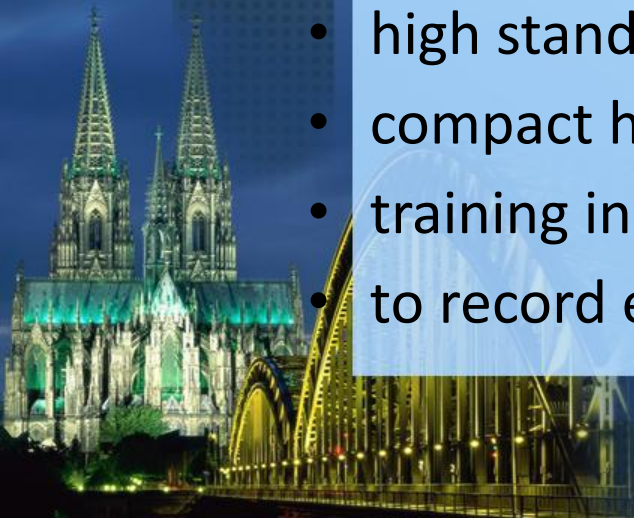


- 7) Would you buy the advertised things? Why? Why not?
