# Māui's Birth

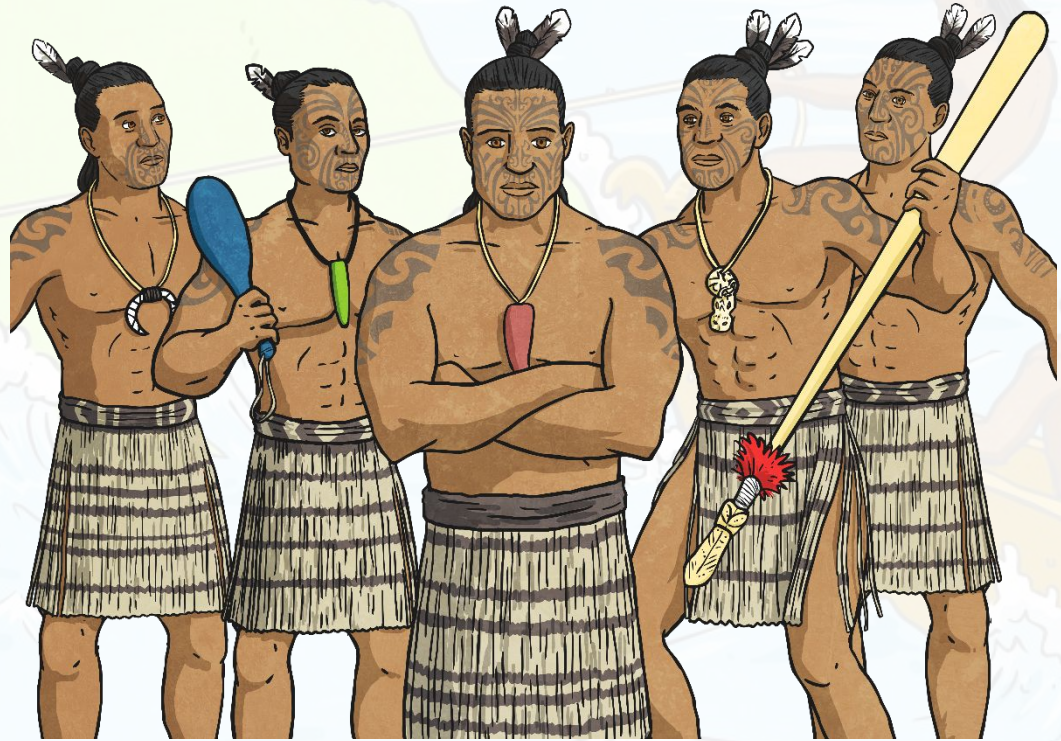
Some legends say Māui was born premature and his mother thought he was dead. She wrapped him in a bundle of hair, her topknot (tikitiki), and threw him into the ocean. The name, Māui-Tiki-Tiki, or "Māui formed in the topknot" was given to him.



# Māui's Life

After being thrown into the sea, it is said that either Tangaroa or Rangi looked after Māui into his teen years. Māui went to look for his mother and brothers and began to live with them.

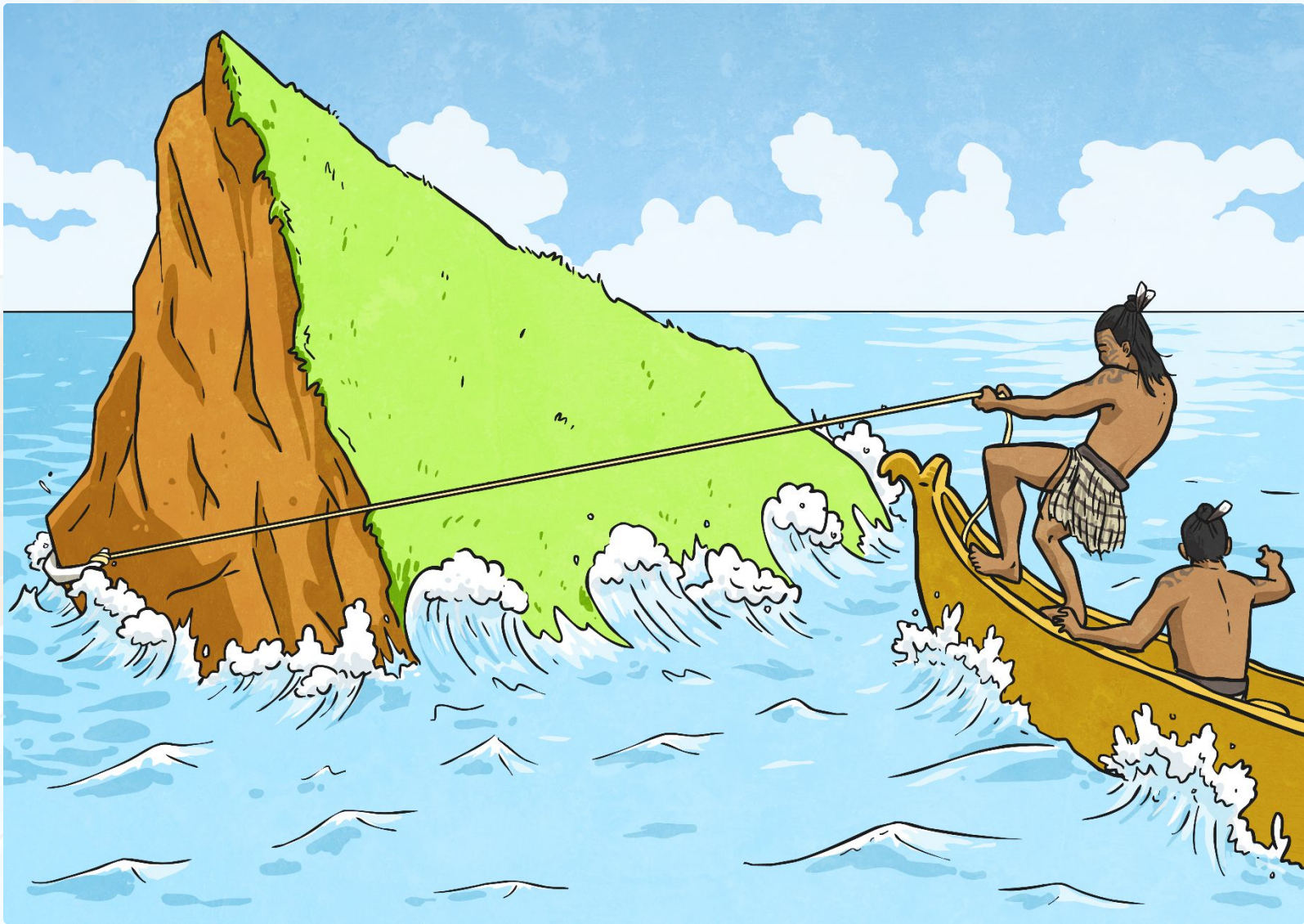
Māui is the youngest of five brothers. They are jealous of him and do not trust him.



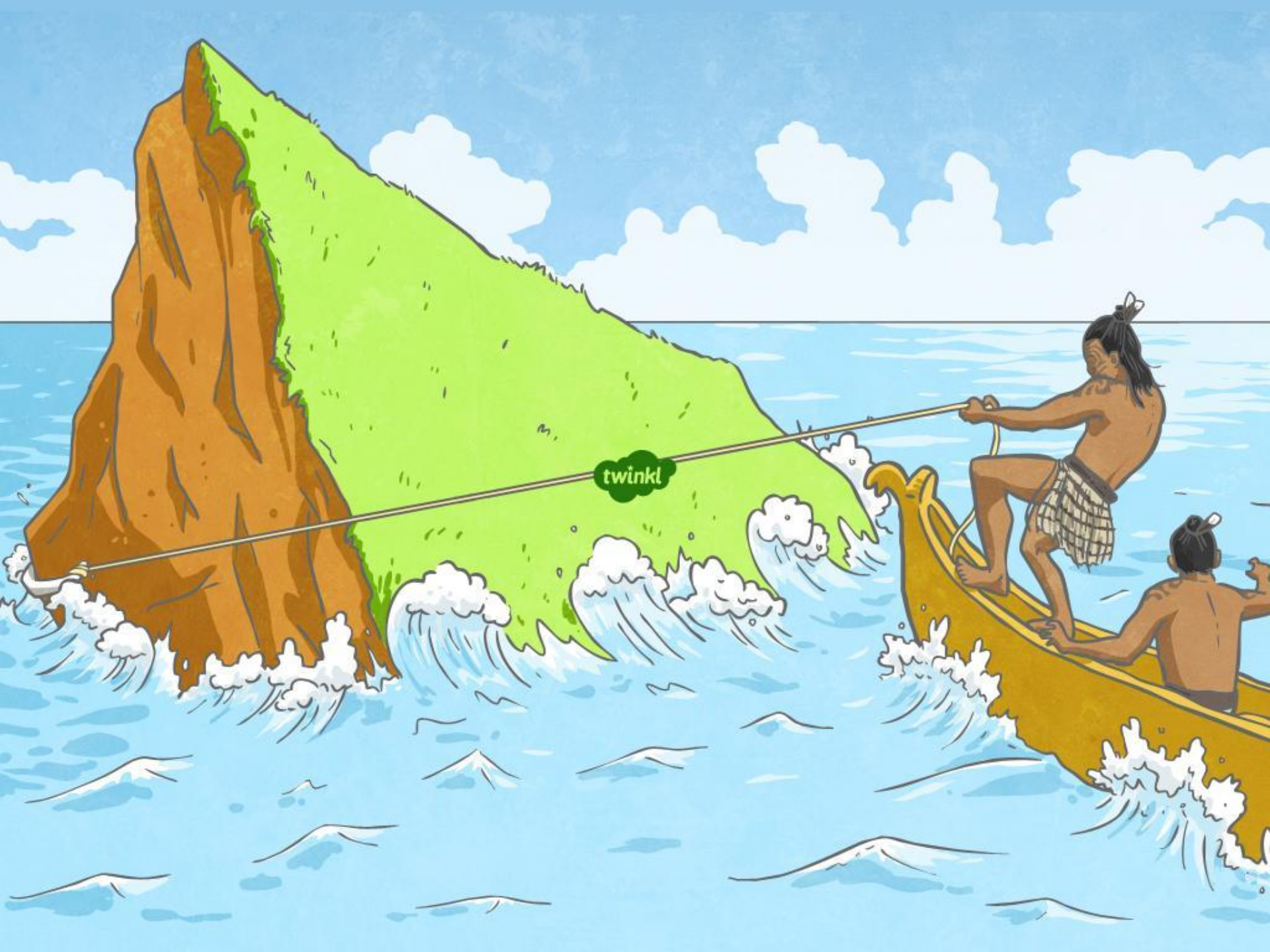
# Legends about Māui
