

# Composite Sentence 1

## Compound

The clauses of which they consist have **equal** rights.


## Complex

The **clauses** aren't equal, **one** of this is the **main clause**, the other is a **subordinate clause**. There may be more than one clause and more than one subordinate clause in a complex sentence.

# Compound sentence

Coordinating sentence	Coordinating conjunctions	Examples
Ыңғайластық	and, as well as not, but also	Father came at seven <b>and</b> we had a supper
Талғаулықты	or, either-...or	They must hurry <b>or</b> they will be late for the lesson
Қарсылықты	but, while, were as	We went home after the evening party <b>but</b> my friend stayed there
Себеп салдар	for, so	It was very late <b>so</b> my brother met me






**Subject clauses which perform the function of predicative and may be introduced by conjunctions that, if, whether and such conjunctive words as who, what, which, when, why, how and others.**



**That you may meet him at the party is quite possible.  
What I need now is someone to do the job.**



**Predicative clauses which perform the function of predicative and may be introduced by the same conjunctions and conjunctive words as subject clauses**



His only desire was  
**that his family  
shouldn't interfere  
with his plans.**

**Object clauses which modify verbs and adjectives as objects to them and may be introduced by the same conjunctions and conjunctive words as subject clauses**
