- We use will + infinitive without to:
- to express a sudden decision made
- at the moment of speaking.
- To express intention or promise.
- To express a prediction based on opinion or beliefs.
 - To make a request or an offer.


Be going to

We use be going to + infinitive without to:

- To express n intention.
- To express a prediction based on something we can observe now.

Hmmm... I am going to sleep!






Present Continuous

I am going to the cinema tonight!






Present Simple

• We use <u>Present Simple</u> to talk about future events that we cannot change.
