<u>The Infinitive</u> is a grammatical term used to refer to certain verb forms that exist in many languages.



THE TO- INFINITIVE IS USED

to express purpose

Sam went to the bank to get some money.

 after verbs agree, apeear, decide, expect, promice, hope, plan etc.

He promised to help us with our decorations.



THE TO- INFINITIVE IS USED

- ✓ after adj.
- a. happy, glad, etc
- b. willing, eager, reluctant, etc.
- c. mean, clever, etc.
- d. lucky and fortunate

<u>I was annoyed to hear that he had left.</u> <u>He is reluctant to help.</u>



THE TO- INFINITIVE IS USED

✓ after smth., somewhere, anyone, nothing, etc.

<u>We've got a lot of homework to do.</u> <u>Take somethink to drink on the bus.</u>

✓ after verbs ask, learn, wonder, decided, etc. when they're followed by who, what, where, how, exept why.

He explained how to operate the machine.



THE BARE INFINITIVE IS USED

after modal verbs.

He should apologise to his parents.

✓ after the verbs let, make, see hear and feel

They saw her talk to the manager.



THE BARE INFINITIVE IS USED

after had better and would rather.

You had better see a doctor.
