





Visiting the gardens

Admission to the Formal Gardens and the Maze is included with your palace ticket. Admission to the Formal Gardens only (admission only charged during official summer time) and the Maze only can be purchased separately. A separate charge applies to the horse and tram ride.



The Maze Begun in 1690 as a form of country entertainment for William ///, today the Maze covers one third of an acre and consists of half a mile of winding paths surrounded by towering yew tree walls. On average it takes 20 minutes to reach the centre.




The Great Fountain Garden

Relax in the shade of the historic yew trees, marvel at glistening fountain or take a stroll along the Broad Walk wall which, at 580 metres, is the longest herbaceous border in Britain.



Horse and tram rides


Enjoy a leisurely ride on our horse and which will lead you and your family trough the beautiful gardens around the East Front. Rides run throughout the summer months, weather permitting.



The Lower Orangery Garden

Once the home of Queen Mary's Exotick plant collection, this garden has been restored to its former brilliance of 1702. Displays include colourful seasonal beds next to citrus trees and cacti in impressive replica ornamental vases. Nearby, you can discover the magic of the hidden Pond Gardens which were

originally used for holding freshwater fish for the royal courts.



The Great Vine

Planted in 1768 by the celebrated gardener 'Capability' Brown, the magnificent Great Vine is the oldest in the world and still produces a yearly crop of black, sweet grapes.



How to get here

Train: 30 minutes from London Waterloo.

Bus: 111, 216, 461, 411, 513, R68.

Car: From the M25 take either exit 10 and the A307, or exit 12 and the A308. From central London take the A3 to the Hock underpass and then the A309. Parking is available on site (free applicable).

River boats: (April-Sept) Westminster, Richmond and Kingston.
