INSPIRE (verb)

- First Known Use: 14th century
- 1. to encourage someone by making them feel confident and eager to do something: *We need someone who can inspire the team.*
- **inspire somebody to do something** : *He inspired many young people to take up the sport.*
- **inspire somebody to something** : *I hope this success will inspire you to greater efforts.*
- **ВДОХНОВЛЯТЬ, ВООДУШЕВЛЯТЬ**
- *The general's speech inspired vigour in the men. —*
Речь генерала воодушевила людей.
- **Synonym:** encourage

INSPIRE (verb)

- 2. to make someone have a particular feeling or react in a particular way: *Gandhi's quiet dignity inspired great respect.*
- **inspire confidence** (=make people feel confident because they trust your ability) *His driving hardly inspires confidence.*
- *The hospital's record does not inspire confidence.*
- **ВНУШАТЬ, ВСЕЛЯТЬ**
- *to inspire smb. with hope , to inspire hope in /into/ smb.* - вселить в кого-л. надежду
- *to inspire smb. with new life* - вдохнуть в кого-л. новую жизнь; придать кому-л. свежие силы

INSPIRE (verb)

- 3. to give someone the idea for something, especially a story, painting, poem etc: *The story was inspired by a chance meeting with an old Russian duke.*
- способствовать, влиять, стимулировать
- *the book was inspired by his travels in the Far East* - стимулом для написания книги послужила его поездка по Дальнему Востоку
- **Synonym:** impel, affect, motivate
- инспирировать, тайно внушать
- *to inspire false stories about smb.* - распространять /инспирировать/ ложь о ком-л.

INSPIRE (verb)

- 4. to breathe in
- **ВДЫХАТЬ**
- *the air we inspire* - воздух, которым мы дышим
- **Synonym:** inhale



INSPIRATION (noun)

- First Known Use of *INSPIRATION*

- 14th century

- 1. a good idea about what you should do, write, say etc, especially one which you get suddenly

- COLLOCATIONS

- ***provide inspiration (for something)*** - The Malvern Hills have provided inspiration for many artists and musicians over the decades.
- ***seek/look for inspiration*** - He raised his eyes to the altar as if seeking inspiration.
- ***draw/take inspiration (from somebody/something)*** (=get inspiration from someone or something) - He draws inspiration from ordinary scenes.

INSPIRATION (noun)

- **вдохновение, воодушевление**
 - *flash / spark of inspiration* — искра вдохновенья
 - *to give / offer / provide inspiration* — вызывать, пробуждать вдохновение
 - *divine inspiration* — божественное вдохновение
 - *inspiration comes (from many sources).* — Вдохновение черпается из многих источников.
 - *Her example was an inspiration to young people.* — Её пример вдохновлял молодёжь.
 - *What gave him the inspiration to do it?* — Что вдохновило его это сделать?
 - *to do smth. by inspiration* - сделать что-л. в минуту вдохновения

INSPIRATION (noun)

- 2. a person, experience, place that gives you new ideas for something you do: *The seascapes of Cape Cod were her inspiration.*
- **inspiration for/behind** He was the inspiration for Wordsworth's poem 'The Old Huntsman'.
- **вдохновитель, стимул**
- *She had a sudden inspiration.* — Её осенила блестящая идея.
- **Synonym:** suggestion, awakening

INSPIRATION (noun)

- 3. to make someone feel encouraged to be as good, successful as possible: *People like Tara are an inspiration to us all.*

under the inspiration of somebody

- used to say who made a person or group want to do something
- **ВЛИЯНИЕ, ВОЗДЕЙСТВИЕ**
- influence, impact
- 4. the act of drawing in: the drawing of air into the lungs
- **ВДЫХАНИЕ, ВДОХ**
- **Synonym:** inhalation, breathing in



INSPIRATIONAL (adjective)

- providing or showing creative or spiritual inspiration:
the team's inspirational captain
- making you feel hopeful or encouraged: *He gave an inspirational reading of his own poems.*
- вдохновляющий, воодушевляющий



INSPIRATIONALLY (adverb)

- with inspiration; in an inspiring manner: *he talked inspirationally.*
- *вдохновенно*



INSPIRED (adjective)

- 1. having very exciting special qualities that are better than anyone or anything else: *an inspired leader*
- She gave an *inspired* performance.
- Вдохновенный
- *in an inspired moment* - в момент вдохновения

INSPIRED (adjective)

- 2. **inspired guess/choice**
- a good or successful choice, guess that is based on inspiration not facts: *In an inspired move, they took on the relatively inexperienced Ray Unwin as director.*
- He was an *inspired* choice for the role.
- *вдохновенный*

INSPIRED (adjective)

- 3. **politically/religiously inspired**
- started for political, religious reasons: *We suspect that the violence was politically inspired.*
- *священный*
- *our interpretations of the Inspired Word* — наши толкования Священного Слова
- *Inspired writings* - священное писание



INSPIRING (adjective)

- First Known Use of *INSPIRING*

- 1717

- giving people a feeling of excitement and a desire to do something great: *inspiring music*
- *King was a great orator and an inspiring leader.*
- *вдохновительный; вдохновляющий*
- *It was inspiring to watch.* — Наблюдение за этим очень вдохновляло.



INSPIRINGLY (adverb)

- In an inspiring manner:
- *This year, as every year, award-winners talked **inspiringly** of being true to yourself, becoming an artist, and taking risks*
- *вдохновляюще*



AWE-INSPIRING (adjective)

- 1. extremely impressive in a way that makes you feel great respect: *a truly awe-inspiring achievement*
- Her knowledge of computers is quite awe-inspiring.
- разг. волнующий, впечатляющий
- arousing awe through being impressive or formidable: *Michelangelo's awe-inspiring masterpiece*
- 1) внушающий благоговейный ужас; повергающий в трепет



INSPIRATOR (noun)

- First Known Use of *INSPIRATOR*

- 1624

- one that inspires: *teachers who are inspirators of the young*

- *вдохновитель*



INSPIRIT (verb)

- First Known Use of *INSPIRIT*
 - 15th century
- to fill with spirit
- воодушевлять, вдохновлять; ободрять; вдохнуть (жизнь, мужество)
- *to inspirit smb. to a feat* - вдохновить кого-л. на подвиг

Synonym: enliven, animate, encourage, incite



UNINSPIRING (adjective)

- not at all interesting or exciting: *No one deserved to win this uninspiring game.*
- скучный, не вдохновляющий, неинтересный, не создающий стимула
