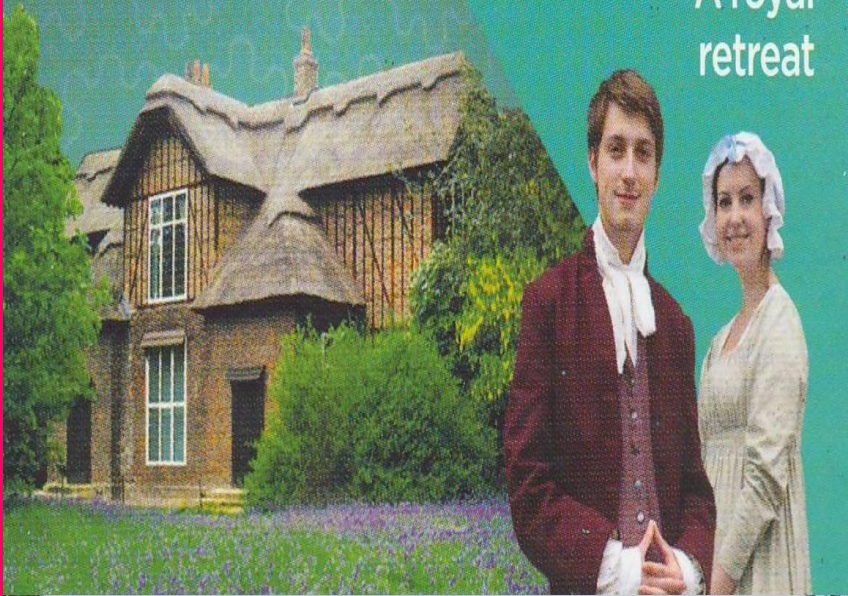

Georgian style

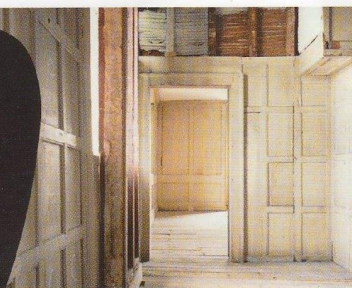
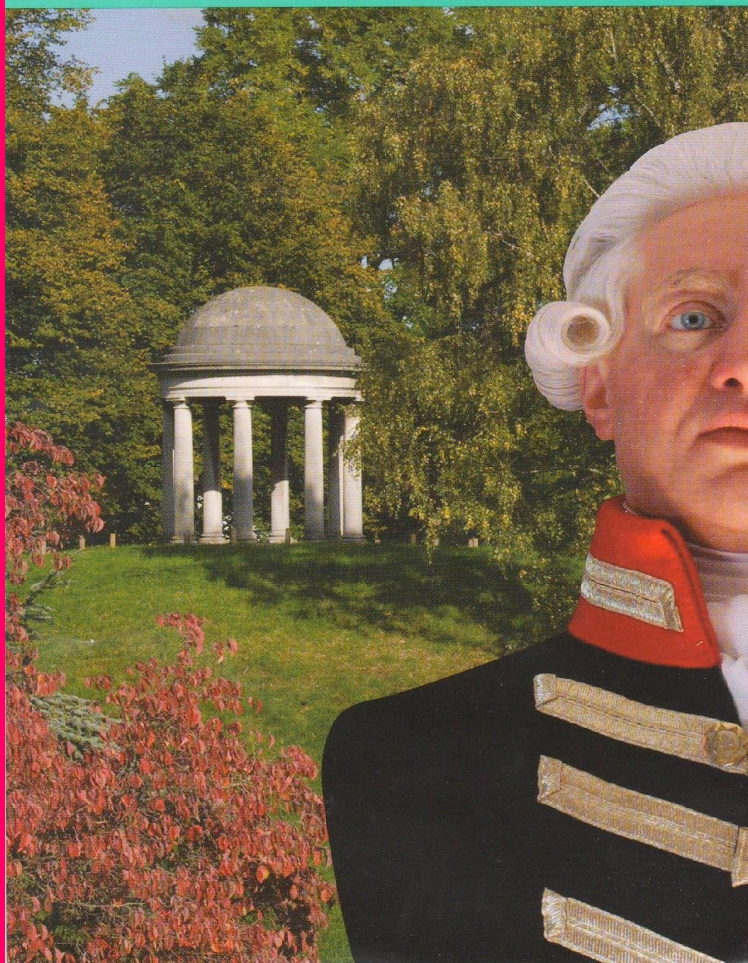
Explore the rooms that have been restored to their original Georgian splendour, appearing as they would have done in 1804. George III's daughter, Princess Elizabeth was given the freedom to decorate her bedroom in the latest style. Come and decide what you make of her interior design skills.

The 'madness' of King George

George III was kept at Kew Palace during his episodes of so-called 'madness'. As you walk the corridors of the palace learn about the horrific treatments the King's doctors administered, and discover for yourself the root of the King's malady.

Peeling back the layers

Explore the archaeological treasure trove of the deserted rooms and corridors on the second floor. Many of the rooms have lain untouched for almost two centuries, abandoned by the royal family following the death of Queen Charlotte in 1818.



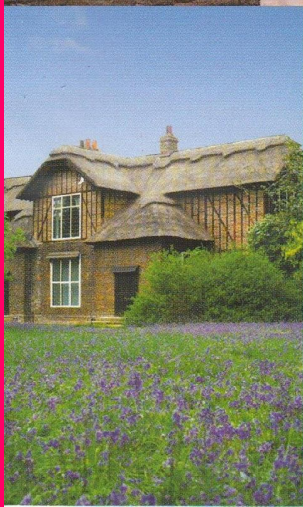
The Royal Kitchens

Next door to Kew Palace, the Georgian Royal Kitchens remain miraculously preserved, 200 years after they were last used. Step back in time to 6 February 1789, the day George III was given his knife and fork back after his first bout of 'madness'.

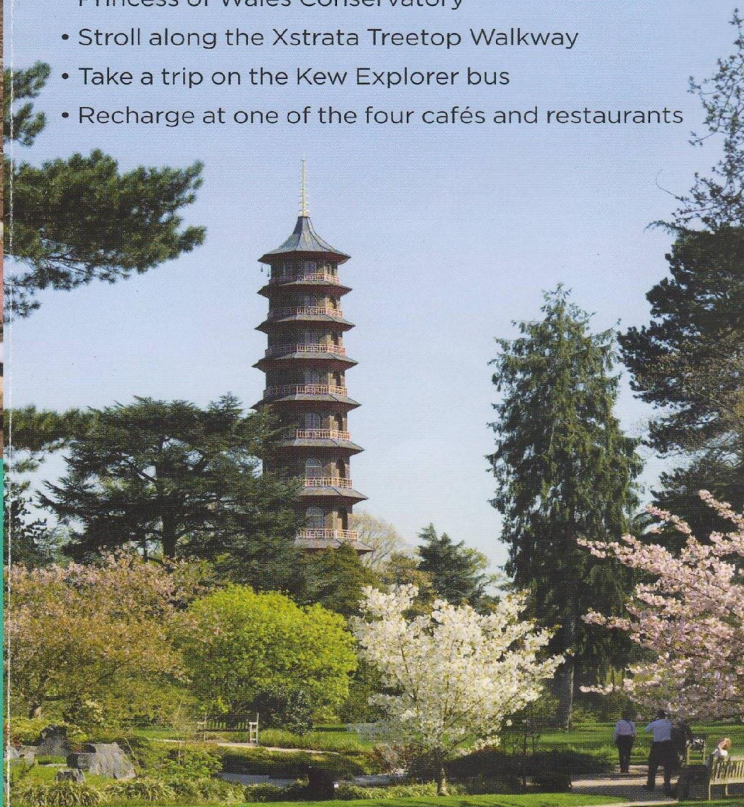
Kew Gardens

Follow in the footsteps of George III, Queen Charlotte and their children by combining a visit to Kew Palace with a picnic in the shadow of their magnificent Pagoda.

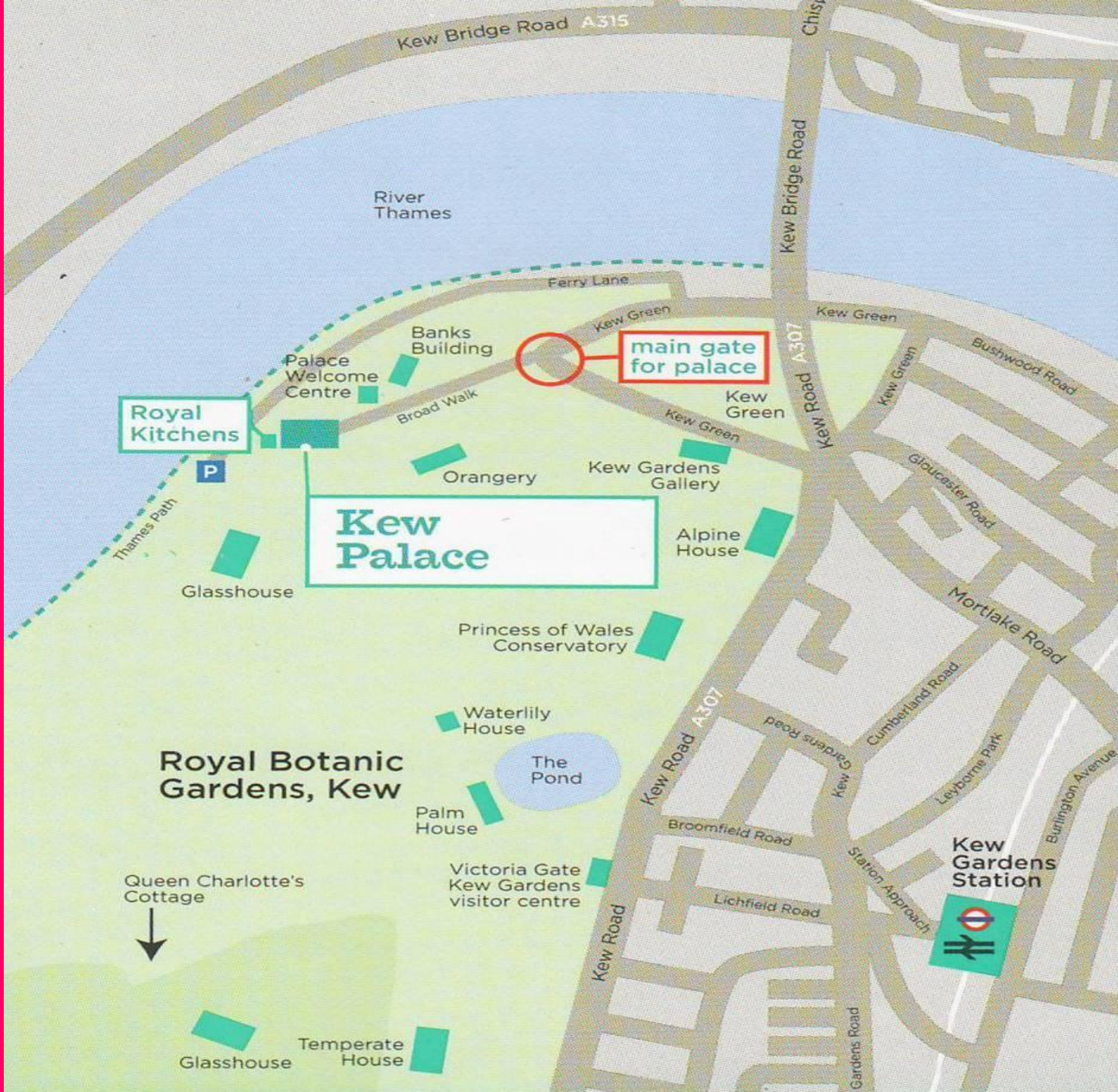
