
New York

- New York, a state in the Middle Atlantic region of the United States. It is bordered by the Canadian provinces of Ontario and Québec on the north and by Lake Ontario and Lake Erie on the northwest and west. Pennsylvania lies west and south of New York, and New Jersey and the Atlantic Ocean lie to the south. On the east the state is bordered by Connecticut, Massachusetts, and Vermont. New York, commonly known as New York City, is the largest city.

Central Park, New York City

State Capitol, New York

Albany became the capital of New York in 1797, succeeding Kingston, Poughkeepsie, and New York City. The State Capitol, completed in 1899, sits at one end of the city's modern Empire State Plaza. A succession of architects contributed to the building's 32-year construction project, and the result shows an interesting amalgam of French, Italian, and Romanesque influences
