Investigative journalism

The genre of "investigative journalism" was formed by American journalists, who were called "muckrakers." As part of this genre was investigated the Watergate scandal, it was finest hour the industry. Later, the tradition of the genre inherited the American documentary film maker Michael Moore.



On May 23, 2008 in the United States, there were 1422 dailies and weeklies 6253.

Popularity daily newspapers falls from year to year, and in these conditions editions difficult save editorial independence. By 1990, in New York was only five daily newspapers and at the end of the XIX century, there were 18.



After the 2008 financial crisis, the state of the industry is not in the best shape. Only in 2008 was fired 16,000 journalists. Tribune Company (which owns the LA Times) declared bankruptcy. One of the oldest U.S. newspaper «Rocky Mountain News» has ceased to exist, putting an end to 150 years of its history.
