






Sights of New York

It has become a symbol of the city (if not of the whole country) and an expression of freedom to people all over the world. The statue shows liberty as a proud woman draped in the graceful folds of a loose robe. In her uplifted right hand, she holds a glowing torch. She wears a crown with seven spikes that stand for the light of liberty shining on the seven seas and seven continents. In her left arm, she holds a tablet with the date of the Declaration of Independence. A chain that represents tyranny lies broken at her feet. The Statue of Liberty was France's gift to America. It was designed by the French sculptor Bartholdi and presented to the USA in 1886. The Lady in the Harbour stands 151 feet tall, weighs nearly 225 tons and has a 35-foot waist. In 1986 she underwent a face-lift in honour of her 100th birthday.

There is a museum in the base of the statue devoted to the history of immigration to the United States.

365 steps lead from the entrance to the observation area in the seven-pointed crown (visitors are not allowed to climb to the torch). The views are breathtaking. The Lady of the Harbour is tourists' favourite souvenir. It takes the form of salt shakers and pencil sharpeners, adorns plates and T-shirts.

Empire State Building, New York City ,USA






The Empire State Building is the tallest building in New York. It is 443 metres nigh and has 103 floors. It was built in 1930, and took one year and forty-five days to complete. The Empire State Building is one of the largest office spaces in the world, but it also has many shops and restaurants inside. The Empire State Building has 73 super fast lifts. The fastest of these travel from the ground to the 80th floor in only 45 seconds! If you choose to walk to the top, you need to climb 1860 steps. At the Empire State Building most visitors go straight to the Observatory on the 86th floor. The view is amazing. On a clear day you can see for miles around. Looking at the Empire State Building from a distance is also great. The top floors are decorated with beautiful lights

Central Park in New-York





CENTRAL Park (Central Park) is the most visited park in the United States. In the year it is about 25 million people. The size of the park: 4 km long and 0.8 km wide. Rectangular area of the park - a green island of tranquility in bustling Manhattan. Despite the fact that Central Park is not a building or structure is a magnificent architectural creation in New York. His stories were different times, he experienced periods of devastation and desolation, but Central Park has always played an important role in the life of New York.



Central Park was opened to the public in 1859, but for the realization of the plan of tremendous effort. For 20 years, approximately 20,000 workers moved vast amounts of land, planted five million trees had drainage of wetlands, ponds dug and blasted rocky areas of the landscape.

Over time, the Central Park in New York and was complemented by upgraded playgrounds, sculptures, skating rinks and individual buildings, but a radical change "turf project" has not undergone. Central Park is a striking green spaces in the heart of New York.

The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York City, USA





The Metropolitan Museum of Art (colloquially The Met), located in New York City, is the largest art museum in the United States and one of the ten largest in the world. Its permanent collection contains more than two million works, divided among seventeen curatorial departments. The main building, located on the eastern edge of Central Park along Manhattan's Museum Mile, is by area one of the world's largest art galleries. There is also a much smaller second location at "The Cloisters" in Upper Manhattan that features medieval art.

The Metropolitan Museum of Art was founded in 1870 by a group of American citizens. The founders included businessmen and financiers, as well as leading artists and thinkers of the day, who wanted to open a museum to bring art and art education to the American people. It opened on February 20, 1872, and was originally located at 681 Fifth Avenue.

As of 2012, the Met occupies about 2,000,000 square feet (190,000 m²). Admission is pay what you wish with a recommendation of \$25.



Manhattan, New York City, USA





Manhattan is the most densely populated of the five boroughs of New York City. The borough is coterminous with New York County, founded on November 1, 1683 as an original county of the U.S. state of New York. The borough consists mostly of Manhattan Island, bounded by the East, Hudson, and Harlem Rivers, but also includes several small adjacent islands, as well as Marble Hill, a small neighborhood on the U.S. mainland.



Manhattan has been described as the economic and cultural center of the United States and serves as home to the United Nations Headquarters. Wall Street, in Lower Manhattan, has been called the financial capital of the world, and is home to the New York Stock Exchange and NASDAQ. Many multinational media conglomerates are based in the borough. Historically documented to have been purchased by Dutch colonists from Native Americans in 1626 for the equivalent of US\$24, Manhattan real estate has since become among the most expensive in the world, with the value of Manhattan Island itself estimated to exceed US\$3 trillion in 2014.
