Nation-Building: Primordialism

- Steven Grosby (1995), 'primordial' refers to the 'significance of vitality which man attributes to nativity', including lineage, family, and, most importantly, territory.
- Ethnicity is 'deeply ingrained in human history and experience' (Wolff 2006, p. 33).
- Nation is viewed as an extended family
- Primordialists: Clifford Geertz, Harold Isaacs, Walker Connor

Constructivists

- Ethnicity is socially and politically constructed over time
- Ethnicity is 'foremost a resource in the hands of leaders to mobilize followers in the pursuit of other interests' (Wolff 2006, p. 33).
- Nation is viewed as an 'imagined political community' (Anderson, 2006)
- Constuctivists: Benedict Anderson, Ernest Gellner, Donald Horowitz, Eric Hobsbawm,

- Why people attach to their nation or ethnic group
- The focus is on the role of ethnie (ethnic community) in the formation of nations
