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She worked at the biscuit factory and often <u>gave</u> Dana a small bag of biscuits.	GIVE
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
Dana <u>didn't like</u> sweets and pastries very much, but she could never resist those biscuits – they were so fresh and tasty.	NOT/LIKE


When Dr. James <u>was driving</u> slowly to work, he saw an accident.	DRIVE
