Мы используем **возвратные местоимения:**

после определенных глаголов (**cut, behave, burn, enjoy, hurt, look at, teach, etc.**), когда подлежащее и дополнение - одно и тоже лицо.

I've cut **myself**.

Мы используем **усилительные местоимения:**

в конце предложения, чтобы обратить внимание на подлежащее/существительное или подчеркнуть, что именно этот человек выполняет действие.

He can fix the car (by) **himself**.

Обратите внимание на выражения: **Enjoy yourself!** = Хорошо тебе провести время! **Behave yourself!** = Веди себя хорошо! **I like being by myself.** = Я люблю побыть один. **She lives by herself** = Она живет одна. **Help yourself to tea.** = Наливай себе чай, угощайся.

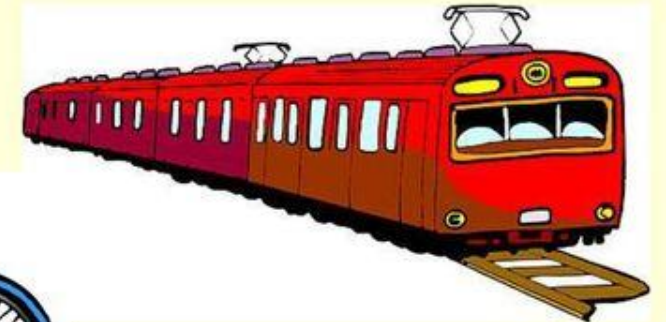

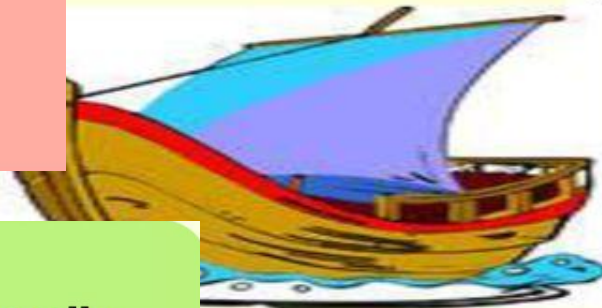

Прилагательные описывают существительные. Они не изменяются по числам (одна форма для ед. и мн. числа). Прилагательные ставятся перед существ. и после глагола *to be*.

She's got three **lovely** children. (Какие дети? Чудесные)

That car **is fast**. (Какая это машина? Быстрая)

Наречия описывают глаголы, объясняют, **как** (нар. образа действия) / **где** (наречия места) / **когда** (нар. времени) / **как часто** (нар. частотности) что-либо происходит.

He drives **carefully**. (Как он водит машину? Осторожно)

Наречия обычно образуются путем добавления **-ly** к прилагательному.

slow-slowly

Некоторые наречия совпадают по форме с прилаг.: **hard, fast, early, daily, late, monthly**.

He runs **fast**. He is a **fast** runner.

Некоторые наречия образуются не по основному правилу (исключения).

good - **well** He's a good singer. He sings **well**.

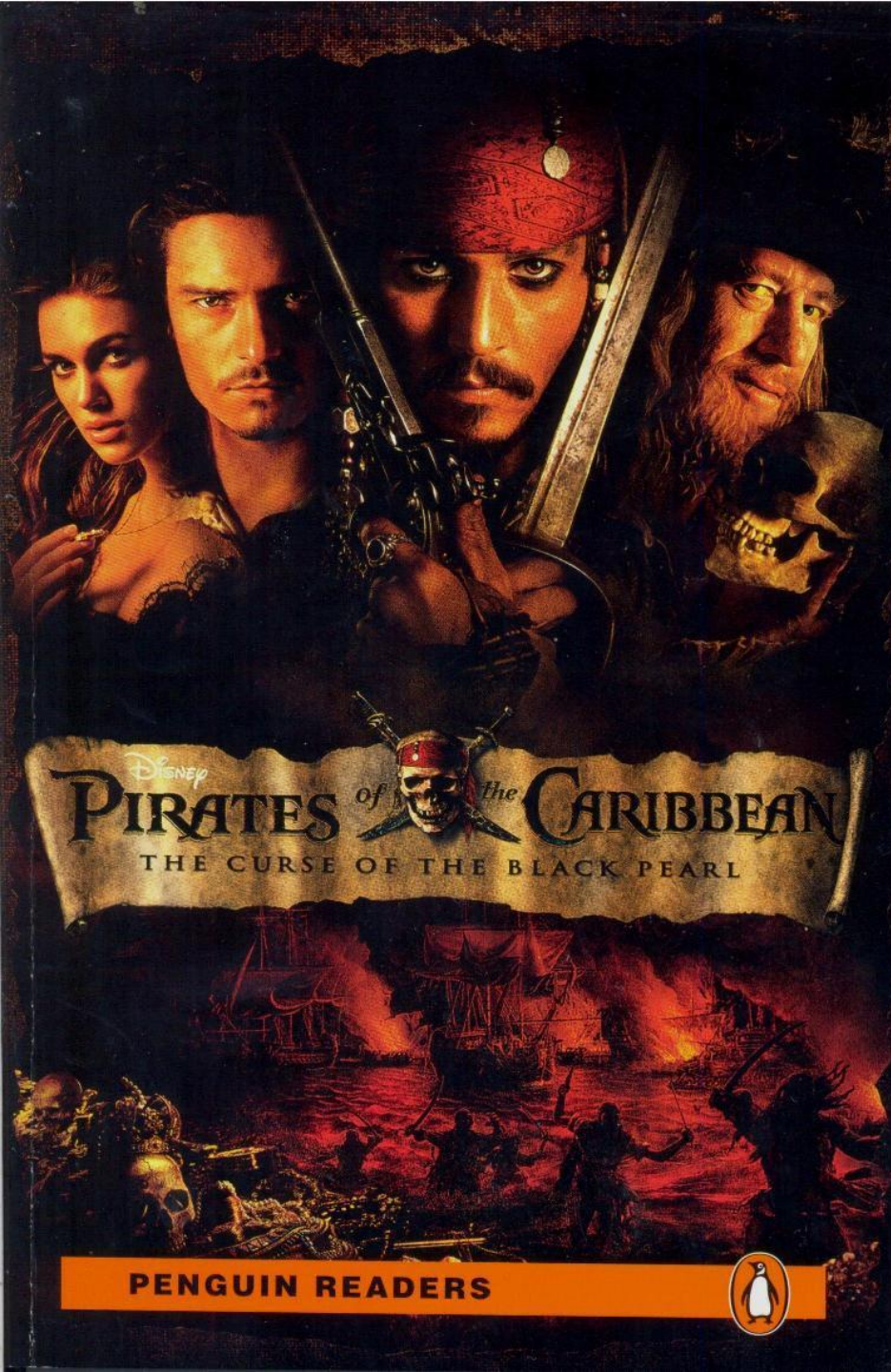

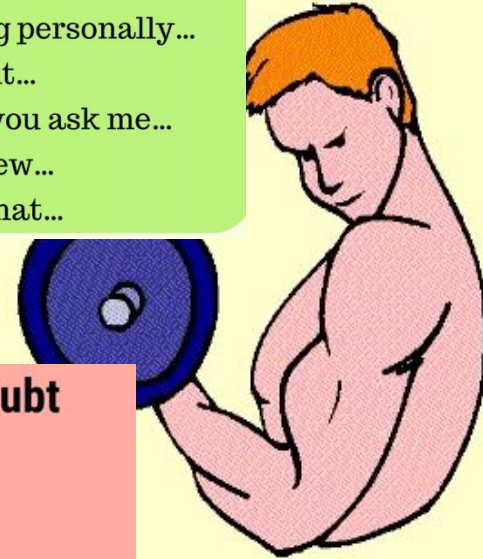
