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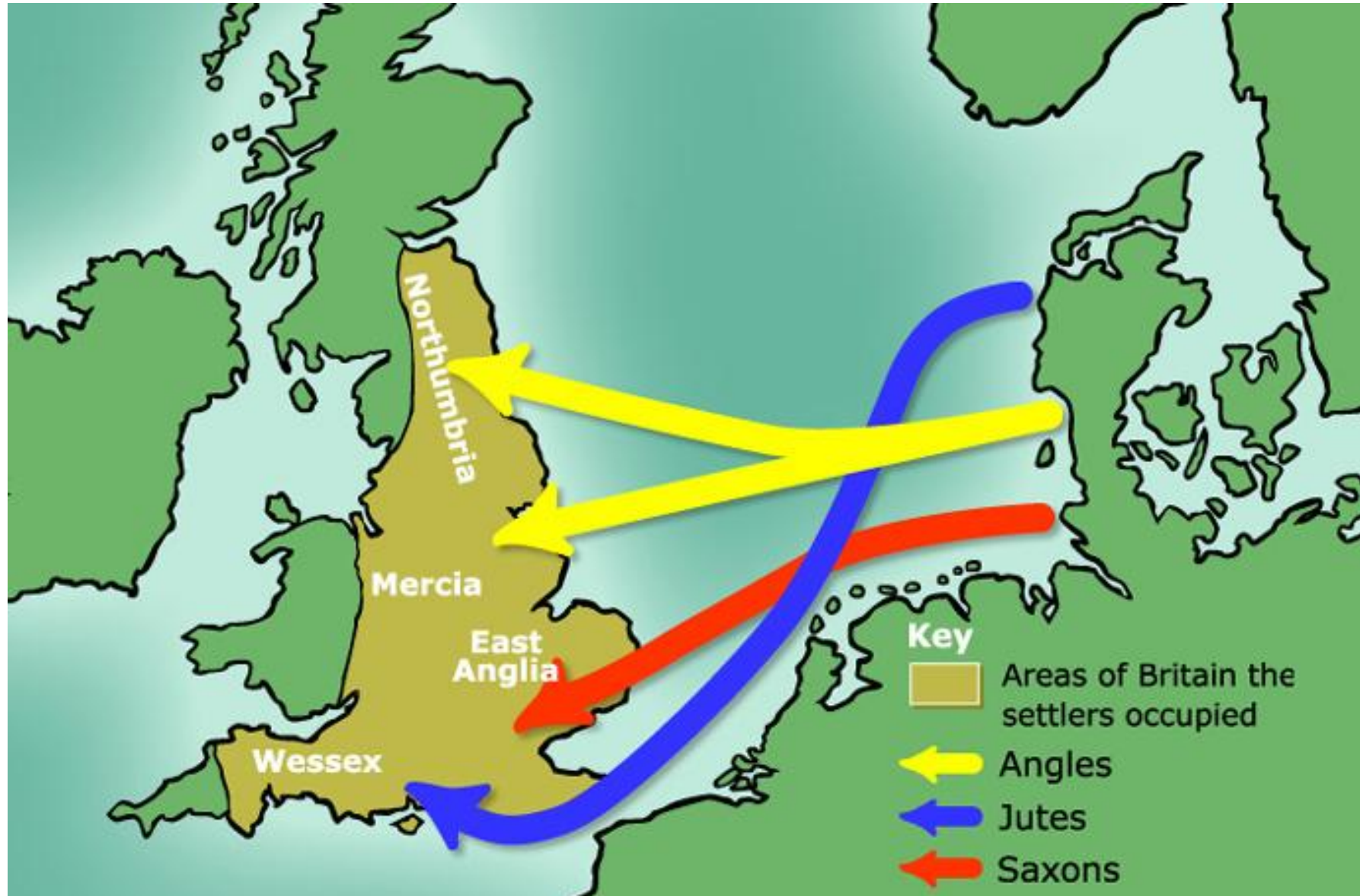

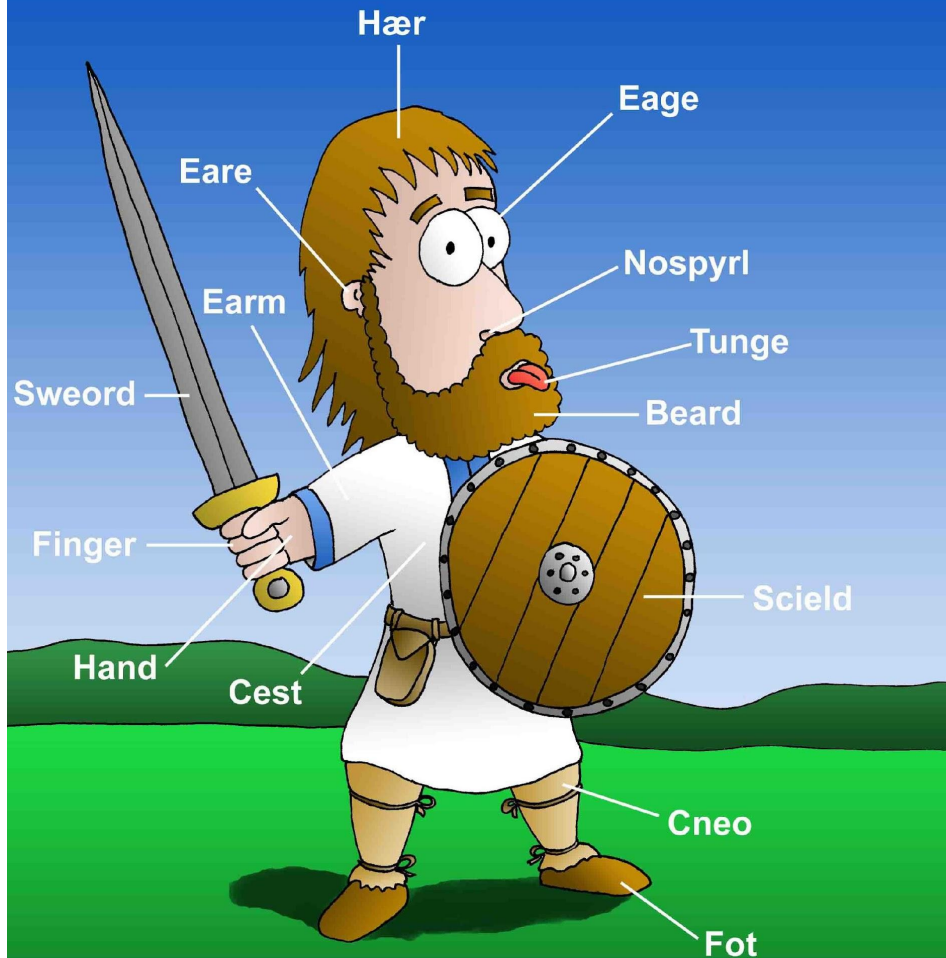

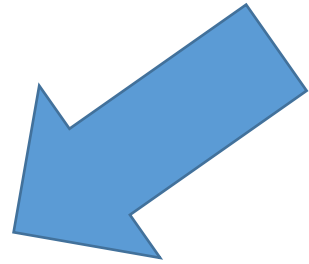


Anglo-Saxon Words

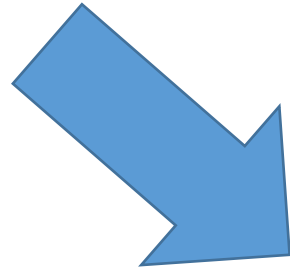


The English language has evolved from a type of German brought to these islands by the invading Anglo-Saxons. Even after 1000 years certain words are still in use, or would be understood today.

They spoke different dialects of the West Germanic language

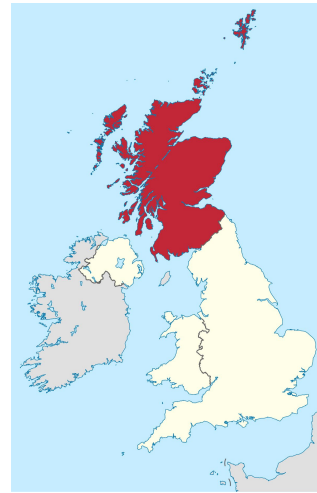

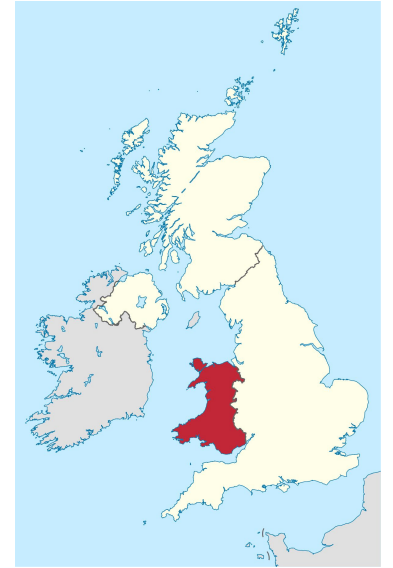

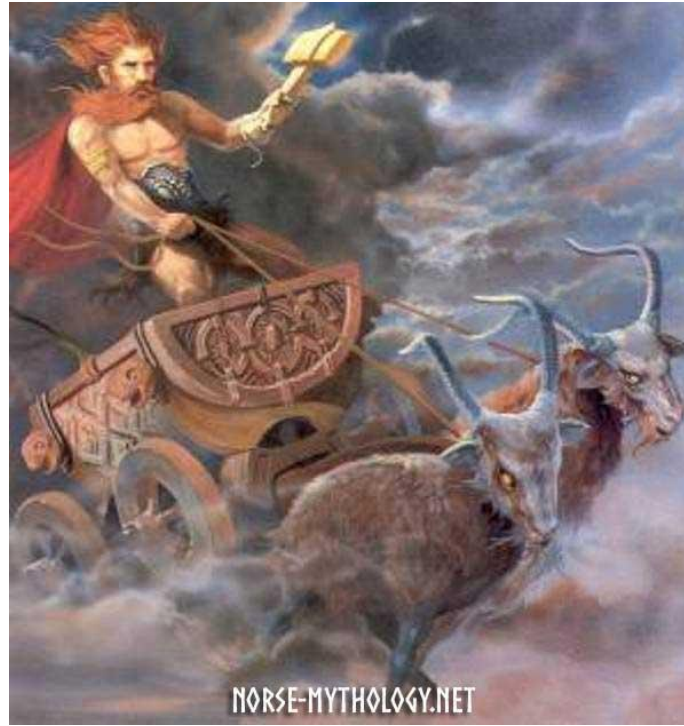
