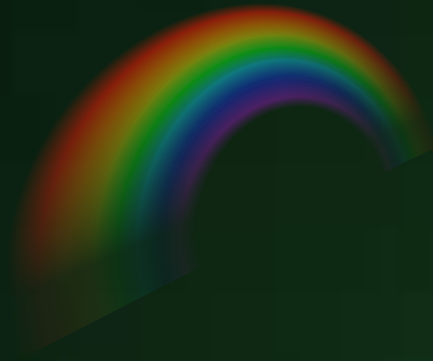

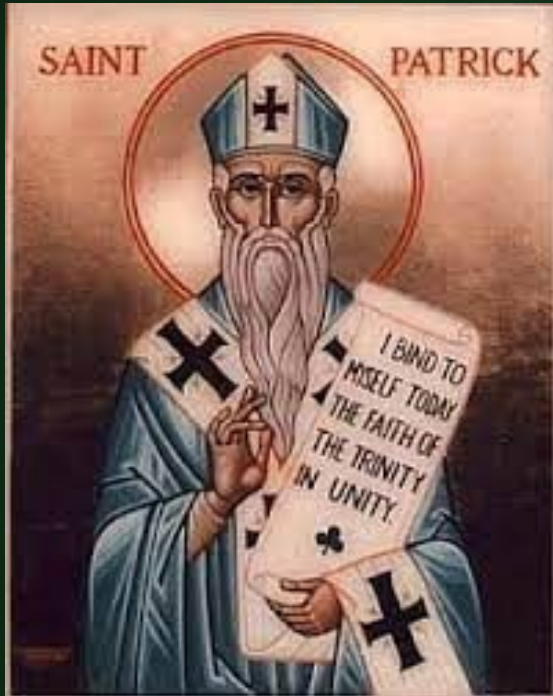




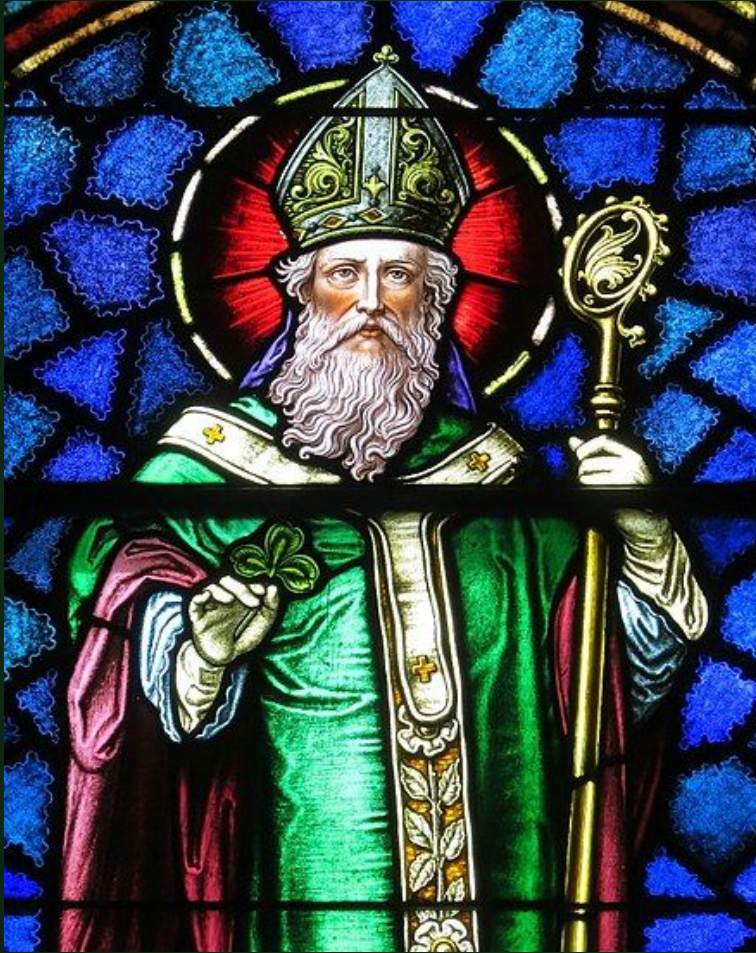

St. Patrick's Day

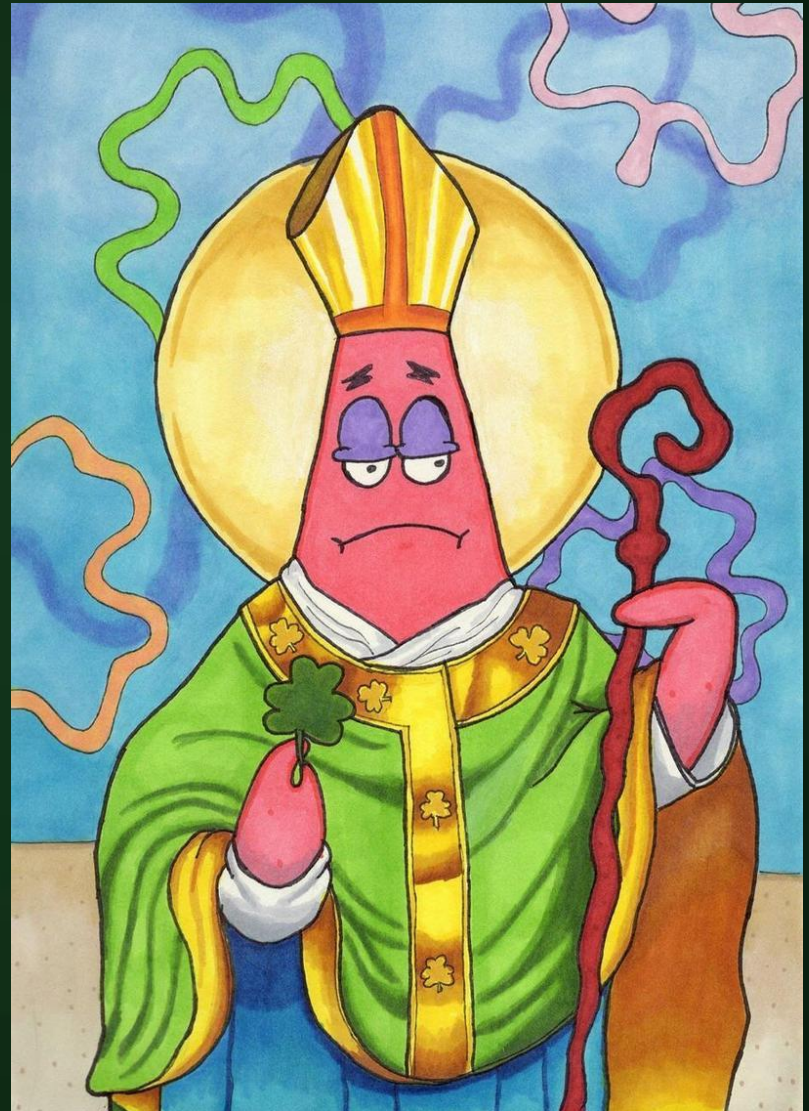


Saint Patrick is the patron of Ireland, known for his religious activities.
