We speak about future.

We make predictions about future.

We use *will (won't)* when we are sure.

We use *might* when we are not sure.

1. A mobile often **won't** **work** because there's no signal.
2. You'**ll** **be** safe inside your car.
3. Move away from the other bees – they **might** **sting** you too.

Won't = will not

'll = will

Use bare infinitive (without to) after *will* and *might*.
