


# Geographic location





- one of the four countries of the UK

#### Shamrock




- a three-leafed old white clover
- According to a legend, the plant was used by Saint Patrick to illustrate the doctrine of the Trinity

#### St. Patrick



- the most generally recognized patron saint of Ireland
- Patrick's Day (17
   March), supposedly
   the day of his death,
   is celebrated both in
   and outside of
   Ireland




- A legend tells of a time when Ulster was without a king. A boat race was arranged.
- The one whose hand would be the first to touch the shore of Ulster would win the crown.
- One contestant determined to be the next king. Seeing that he was losing the race, he cut off his hand and threw it to shore thus winning the race and crown.

#### the Ulster Banner




- was used officially by the Government of Northern Ireland between 1953 and 1972
- since 1972 has had no official status
- still used to represent Northern Ireland in some sporting events

#### the Coat of Arms



- was granted to the Government of Northern Ireland in 1924
- in 1972 the arms went out of official use

#### Belfast



- the capital of and the largest city in Northern Ireland and the second largest city in Ireland
- the capital of Northern Ireland since 1921
- situated on Northern Ireland's eastern coast
- a centre for industry, as well as the arts, higher education and business

## Londonderry










- the second-biggest city in Northern Ireland
- on the west of northern Ireland and near the border with Ireland
- an old 6th century walled city
- more usually known as simply Derry
- several museums including Tower
   Museum
- St Columb's Cathedral built in 1633

## Cities and towns









- Northern Ireland has some of the finest castles on the island.
- The earliest are from Norman times, but fortified homes continued to be built well into the 17th century
