#### Present vs past

 Habits and routines in the present

 1. I get up every day at 6 a.m. and go to work.  Habits and routines in the past

When I was a kid,
got up every day at
a.m. and went to
school.

- An action in progress now or around now
- 1. I am talking right now. I'm teaching level intermediate this semester.
- 2. While I'm talking, you're listening.

- An action in progress at the moment in the past or around it
- 1. This time last year I was talking too, but I was teaching upper-intermediate level that semester.
- 2. While I was talking, my students were listening.

- A completed action in the past, result in the present
- 1. She <u>doesn't want</u> to watch this movie because she's seen it already.
- 2. I <u>am</u> sad because I've lost my notebook.

- A completed action in the pre-past, result in the past
- 1. She <u>didn't want to</u> watch this movie because she'd seen it already.
- 2. I <u>was</u> sad because I'd lost my notebook.

- A completed action before the present (experience)
- 1. I '<u>m</u> so happy to finally visit the Bahamas. Look! I've never seen such a beautiful sunset before!
- 2. My sister <u>loves</u> travelling. She's been to 10 countries <u>by</u> <u>now/ up to now.</u>

- A completed action before something in the past (experience)
- 1. I was so happy to finally visit the Bahamas. I'd never seen such a beautiful sunset before. (before I visited the **Bahamas**) 2. My sister loved travelling. She'd been to 10 countries by <u>(then/</u> 2017/ the time she turned
  - 18).

 Don't come in! I haven't finished cleaning yet.  I hadn't finished cleaning when my friend tried to enter the room.



Present perfect
– no exact time

 I have visited the USA in 2015.
I visited the USA in 2015.  Past perfect – possible to use exact time

• 1. She had visited the USA once in 2015 before she moved there in 2017.

 Past perfect with 'thinking' verbs: realize, understand, find out, learn, remember...
1. I came to the office and realized I'd left my wallet at home.

 2. As he was telling the joke, I remembered I'd heard it before.
